It is perhaps well to observe, that a considerable Part of the Donations by Subscription, has been already lost through Insolvencies, &c. and that it remains altogether uncertain what Part of the Sum still due can be recovered. The Probability, however, is, that of the Amount due, as above flated, viz. £ 787 12 4, not more than two-thirds will ever be re-

It is also proper to remark, that there is a great Uncertainty of receiving full Payment even for the Judgments which have been obtained, or for the Bonds in the Hands of the different Agents of the Board. Ano. ther Circumstance worthy of Consideration is, the Expences necessarily incurred in Collections, and also the Sums frequently refunded by the Trustees, as well for Deficiencies in Land fold by their Attornies and Commissioners, as for Lands improperly fold; that is, where such Lands had either been fold by the Commissioners of Confiscation under the State, or were claimed by Rights prior to that of the Trustees. Several fuch Instances have already occurred, and more Claims of the same Kind still remain to be adjusted. On duly weighing these Circumstances, it will be easily feen, that great Allowances must be made in calculating on the Funds of the University. There is much Reason to believe, that the whole Amount, could the proper Deductions be now afcertained, would fall short of Ten Thousand Pounds.
