

RUSSIA.

PETERSBURG, APRIL 30.

This morning was buried with much pomp, Admiral Kutuzof. The Emperor attended the funeral, and was much affected. He has left to the disposal of his widow, a pension of 2000 rubles.

GERMANY.

VIENNA, MAY 15.

According to the accounts of a deserter from the Camp of Passwan Oglou, it is said that he has been blockaded within. He however tends parties as far as Nefar and Nicopolis, but his army is considerably weakened; being not above six thousand men strong, of which 600 are Polanders; his artillery is numerous, but the greater part is unfit for service. However he says his army is regular, and abundantly supplied with provisions. For six months past he has confined himself entirely to the defensive.

HOLLAND.

HAGUE, MAY 23.

The first port at which Admiral De Winter will touch, will be Adrag. Though nothing is officially published respecting the destination of the squadron under his command, it is however known, that he will first visit the Barbary powers, with whom the Adm. is instructed to renew the commercial relations which have been neglected or interrupted by the war.

FRANCE.

PARIS, MAY 29.

We are assured that the quarantine will be rigorously observed of all vessels coming from Spanish America. It is believed that the want of this necessary precaution, introduced the ravaging epidemic of last year in Andalusia.

MAY 31.

His Excellency Ghaleb Effendi, Bachmouahiebe (Comptroller-General of the finances) minister plenipotentiary and envoy of the Sublime Porte, near the government of the French Republic, left Vienna the beginning of Prairial [about the 25th of May]. He is at this moment arrived at Strasbourg. The First Consul had lent Citizen Dupps, superior adjutant of the Palace of government, to the frontiers, to meet that minister, and Citizen Dantan, first interpreter of the French Legation at Constantinople. The Prefects write from all the departments that the will of the citizens is unanimous for the nomination of the First Consul for life.

JUNE 1.

The consuls of the French Republic, on the reports of the minister of marine and colonies, decreed on the 25th, that the islands of Martinique and St. Pierre shall in future be under these magistrates, viz. a Captain-General, a colonial prefect, and a grand judge.

A subscription is set on foot in France, to which the first consul contributes as a private citizen, for rendering the Seine navigable to Paris.

Admiral Villaret arrived at Brest the 20th May last, with 8 sail of his squadron from St. Domingo. Dispatches were received from General Leclerc, charging Touffaint with having committed unexampled cruelties.

Commerce appears to be reviving throughout France; the seaports resuming their accustomed activity. There have arrived at Havre during the Month Floral, from 20th April to 19th May, 87 ships, of which 13 were Americans.

From the 9th of April to the first of May, 24 vessels left the port of Dantzic for Havre, wholly laden with grain; and 9 others were taking in a cargo of the same article at Dantzic on the 15th, intended also for Havre. There is great scarcity of grain throughout the Republic, inasmuch that all exportation of it has been prohibited.

GREAT-BRITAIN.

LONDON, MAY 23.

On the 19th Mr. Otto received a courier from France, who was the bearer of a Formula inclosed in a large book, wherein the French residing in England, are to write their votes on the question, "Shall Napoleon Buonaparte be consul for life?"

An article from Berlin, of the 17th of May, mentions that the King of Prussia and the Emperor of Russia were to have a meeting at Memei on the 16th of May.

Letters from Malta of March 30, mention that Vice-Admiral Sir Richard Bickerton, had sailed for Egypt in the Madras, of 54 guns; and that the evacuation of Malta by our troops, was to take place on the

under Sir James Sumarez, who was momentarily expected.

MAY 25.

The Times announced the approaching arrival of a French commissary, deputed to concert with our government a fixed plan for the commercial relations of the two countries. M. Otto received yesterday, a courier who brought this intelligence.

The Bay of Algiers had consented to receive the arrears of the tribute payable to him by the Americans in bills, of which the first instalments will commence next year.

Dispatches have been received from Bengal, announcing that the province of Oude had come under the dominion of the East-India Company, and that the brother of Marquis Wellesley is appointed Deputy Governor, having under him Messrs. Matthew, Leslie, and Sention. The company have granted a pension to the Nabeb. Marquis Wellesley was to depart for England on his return from Lucknow, retaining, however, his situation of Governor of Bengal. Orders have been sent to his Lordship, for the immediate reduction of his guard.

Mr. Addington, proposing yesterday in the House of Commons, in the committee of Supply, to vote the sum of 173,535l. for the relief of French Emigrants, and American Royalists, took that opportunity of announcing that every facility was given to the former to return to their country. He added that the good-will of the French government on the one part, in permitting their return, and the disposition of England on the other, in concurring with the same object, was the strongest proof of the desire of the two countries to cherish those sentiments which have happily put an end to the war.

TO THE PUBLIC.

THE Proprietors of the Charter for opening the Navigation of the Catawba and Wateree Rivers, having at length been with much Satisfaction, the completion of the Santee Canal, propose to re-nounce their operations for opening of the Catawba and Wateree Rivers during the present year, as soon as the state of the said Rivers will permit. In the mean while, they have determined to double the number of their shares, for the purpose of admitting such persons as may wish to become subscribers. The expences which have been already incurred by the Company, amount to one hundred dollars on each share of the present number, which, when doubled according to the present determination, will reduce it to fifty dollars a share. The Charter of South Carolina is in perpetuity, and these Shares are for ever exempted from any rate, tax, duty, assessment or imposition whatever. The Act of North-Carolina authorizes the Company to fix and establish a toll on all Goods and Merchandise, for 99 years, and exempt their shares from any rate, tax, duty, assessment or imposition whatever, for the same period of time. The present Proprietors think it a duty incumbent on them to inform the public, that a very considerable sum is expected to be raised from the sale of vacant lands (which extend 200 miles on each side the Catawba River, the whole length thereof, from the North-Carolina line down to Camden Parish, a distance of not less than 120 miles, and in which is supposed to be reserved to the Company not less than 55,000 or 60,000 acres) and they think it should be deterred from engaging in the present navigation, by a reference to the enormous expence of the Santee Canal. The Rockholders think it just that they should declare their opinion of the impracticability of the subscribers being called upon for more than 10 dollars on each share per annum, as it would be impossible for the works to be carried on longer than for about four months in the year, since the

labourers will be chiefly employed in the winter. It is further to be remarked, that the Catawba River is looked upon as the most proper site for the establishment of a Magazine, Foundry and Arsenal, for the three Southern States, viz. North and South-Carolina and Georgia; that surveys have been made, and a statement thereof forwarded on this subject some years ago, to the Secretary of War; that the State of South-Carolina passed an act, authorizing a purchase by the United States, of a certain quantity of land within this State; and the Catawba Company have offered to release to the United States, any of their lands on said River, for such purpose, on a fair valuation. The hour now seems to approach for such an establishment; not only because it is a time of almost profound peace throughout the world, but that the idea is revived by the President of the United States, in his message of the 23d of February, 1802, to Congress, wherein he says, "besides the permanent magazines established at Springfield, West-Point and Harper's Ferry, it is thought one should be established at some point convenient for the States of North-Carolina, South-Carolina and Georgia; such a point will be found near the borders of the Carolinas; and some small provision by the legislature, preparatory to the establishment, will be necessary for the present year." And Nature indeed has pointed out this River as the most proper place for such a Magazine, from the vast quantity of iron which have been discovered on the Catawba and its two branches, and there can be no doubt but that such an abundance of metal must attract the attention of the Engineer, who may be authorized to examine and determine on a proper site for this establishment, particularly as there are already several furnaces and forges on the above mentioned Rivers, at some of which six pound guns have been cast and bored, equal to any ever imported or made to the northward. The Company intend, for the present season, to confine their operations to the removal of the obstructions from Rocky Mount to Camden Ferry, to the opening of a Road for a carrying place, and the transportation of goods from above the Falls at Rocky Mount, down to the Old Ferry Landing; and to the erection of a bridge across the Rocky Creek, and to the building a boat, and establishing the ferry, which is allowed them by law.

At a meeting of the Catawba Company, held of March, 1802, two-thirds of them being present. On Motion, Resolved, That the six hundred shares in the Company of the Catawba and Wateree Rivers, be subdivided into twelve hundred. That the present Proprietors be entitled to hold double the number of their present shares; and that they have besides a preference to extend the number of their shares to one thousand ten to which they shall be entitled after such subdivision. To every new subscriber who shall pay 50 dollars, shall be entitled not only to the advantages to be derived from the opening of the said River; but also to a proportionate interest in the Lands vested in the Company by the Legislature of this State. Resolved, That 100 shares be reserved to be offered to the State of South-Carolina, and that an equal number of shares be reserved to be tendered to the State of North-Carolina.

At an anniversary meeting of the Catawba Company, on Thursday the 20th inst., the following resolutions were entered into: 1st. That an advertisement be published, inviting persons to contract for the opening of Grave's Ford, and Love's Ford, to deep and wide as to admit boats drawing a feet or more of water, and 12 water mules, for opening a road and carrying place, from above Rocky Mount to the Ferry Landing below, and for constructing a bridge across Rocky Creek; also, for building a Ferry Boat to ply across the river, at or near the packet landing at Rocky Mount; also for surveying the vacant lands, which have been already granted them by the legislature. Such undertakings to give approved security for the faithful fulfilment of their respective contracts, and to direct their applications to the President, Judge Grimké, during the sitting of the constitutional Court at Columbia, from the 15th to the 25th of April next, or to Charles Lew, the Secretary in Charleston, on or before the 15th day of May next ensuing. That the President do establish a correspondence with some mercantile house in Cambridge, and endeavour to obtain permission to lodge with them the names of the Company, and that they would distribute the same, according to the directions of the Company. That one hundred shares be offered to the citizens of North-Carolina, and that they have to the first day of January next ensuing, to subscribe for such shares; and that General Davie be authorized to appoint some sufficient persons on the part of the Company, payable as in the following resolutions.

That on 1. Sen., Col. Hill, and John Singleton, Esq. Clerk of Lancaster Court, be authorized to receive subscriptions from such persons as are inclined to become proprietors, and who reside within the limits of this State; and that they take notes, payable to the President and Directors of the Company, for opening the navigation of the Catawba and Wateree Rivers, on the first day of March, 1803; and they be authorized to deliver receipts for the same, in the name of scrip, in such form as the President and Directors shall appoint.

That these resolutions, with the last publication in the paper of this city, as far as the President and Directors may see necessary and proper, be inserted in Cox's Sheppard's gazette of this city, and in the one which is printed in Raleigh, North-Carolina, by Joseph Gates, once a month, until the 1st of October next. That the Solicitor of the Company be instructed to adopy the most expedient measures for the recovery of such balances as appear to be due by such proprietors as have paid none of the requisitions for the last 18 months; and that the secretary do furnish him with a list of the names of such delinquents.
