BE it enaded by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of Americain Congress affembled That the Secretary of the Navy be, and he hereby is authorised and empowered, by indenture of bargain and tale, in common form, to conwev, in fee simple, to the proprietors to the salem turnpike and Chelfea heidge corporation, by their proper name of incorporation, a certain piece of land, lying on the Western corner, and being parcel of the Navy yard belonging to the United States, in Charlestown, in the state of Massachusets, containing fifteen square perches, or thereabouts, or to much thereof as is required to enable the faid proprietors to lay out and make a turnpike road from Salem to Charleston bridge, near Boston, according to the plan exhibited to Congress by the said proprictors.

Sec. 2. And beit further enafted. That it shall be the duty of the faid Secretary, prior to the making the faid conveyance, to caule the faid piece of land to be valued by difinprefed men, to be appointed in fuch manner as he shall agree with the feid proprietors; the amount of which faid valuation, being paid to the use of the United States, it shall then and not before, be lawful for, thelaid Secretary to make the afore-

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That it shall be lawful for the col-

Il lector of the cultoms for the diff rict of Miffiffippi, to grant to any thip or vessel owned by citizens of the United States, laden with articles of the growth, produce, or manufac-

ture of the faid flates and actually lying in some part of the river Milfiffippi foath of t'e fouthern boun. dary of the United States, a clear. ance in the same manner as if such ship or veiled was lying within the faid diffriet, which clearance shall be of the form following, to wit.

guns (if any) navigated with men built, now lying in the river Mississippi, out of the limitsof the United States, and bound having on board (here specify the articles if required) being of the growth, produced, or manufacture of the United States, or (if no specification be required) being laden with articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States, hath here cleared his faid vessel accor-

ding to law : .. Given under my hand and feal, at the suftom house of Port Adams, one thousand this day of eight hundred and in the

year of the independence of the United States of America." Provided nevertheless, That fuch elearance shall not be granted until the identity of the articles laden on board fuch hip or veffel, as being of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States. shall be established to the fatisfaction of the faid collector, either by the exhibition of a certificate to that effect, from the conful, vice conful, or other authorised agent of the United States, residing at or near New-Orleans on the faid river, or otherwise: And Provided also, That before the departure of fuch thin or vellel for any foreign port or place without the faid river, it shall be the duty of the master or commander thereof, to exhibit fuch clearance to the faid conful, viceconful, or other authorized agent of the United States, who shall certify thereon, under his confular feal, if he be fatisfied that the state of the cargo at the time of fuch exbition, correspond therewith that fuch is the case; or if the whole or any part thereof thall have been unladen, or otherwife changed, so as not to agree with the tenor of fuch clearance, he shall accordingly fta e he fame.

Sec. 3. And be it further enalled, That the conful, vice-contul, or other authorised agent of the United States, reliding at New-Orleans, or at fuch other place of depofit on thebanks of the Miffiffippi fouth of the fouthern boundary of the United States, as may be alfigned by virtue of the treaty of San Lonenzo shall be entitled to receive from the Captains or owners of American veffels, two dollars for each certificate, he shall fign, certifying that the articles contained in fuch certificate, are of the growth produce, or manufacture of the United States: and he shall also be authorised to employ a proper perfon to attend to the landing and loadling of fuch articles, whose duty therein, and compensation, shall Be it enacted by the Senate and be the same as those of an inspector of cultoms in one of the ports of the United States, which co mpenfation shall be considered as a charge against the revenue, and defraved by the collector for the diffrict of Missisppi, out of the monies re ceived by him on account of the duties on tonnage and merchandize.
