UNITED STATES.

At the Second Seffion, Begun and held at the City of Washington, in the Territory of Columbia, on Monday the fixth of December, one thousand eight bundred and two.

AN ACT To alter the time for the next meeting of Congress.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress affembled, That after the adjournment of the present fession, the next meeting of Congress shall be on the first Monday of November next.

AN ACT

To alter the time of holding the court of the Unici States in Kentucky diftrict.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress af fembled. That from and after the first day of April next the festionsof the court of the United States for Kentucky district shall commence on the first Mondays in March July. and November in every year: any law to the contrary notwithstand

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted. That all forts, process, and proceedings, of what nature or kind foever, pending in, or made returnable to the faid court, shall, after the faid first day of April next be continued over until the next court to be held in conformity to this act.
