WILL be let to Mares at my Stable, within half a mile of Cawell Court-house, at Twenty Dollars the Season, which may be discharged by the Payment of fifteen, provided payment is made by the 1st day of January next. Forty dollars to insure a Mare to be with Foal, with the same deduction as in season, if paid within the same time. Should the property of any Mare insured be changed, the insurance will be demanded in every instance. Should a Mare insured not prove with Foal, the Money will be returned.

The season will commence the 1st of March and end the 10th of August. Good and extensive pasturage well enclosed, and Servants sent with Mares boarded gratis. No liability for accidents or escapes, but the greatest care will be taken to prevent either.

The Proprietors of this Horse contemplate keeping an imported Horse in this Neighbourhood, and should a Mare put by the season not prove with Foal (the money being paid) the Owner will be entitled to a season of the same Mare the next season gratis.

MAGIC will be ten years old next Spring; is a horse of elegant form and great powers, full fifteen hands and a half high, and as well bred a horse as any in England. He was got by Volunteer, one of the best sons of Old Slipper, and sire of Spread Eagle, Eagle, Stirling, Triumvir, Recruit, Commodore, &c. out of Marcella. Marcella was got by Mambrino; her Dam, Media, by Sweet Briar, out of Angelica, by Snap, Regulus, Bartlett's Childers, Honeywood's Arabian, dam of the two True Blues.

MAGIC covered the last three years he was in England, and his colts are considered large and promising.

PERFORMANCES.

See the Racing Calendar for 1797. He received from Mr. Bowe's colt Sadler, five guineas at New-Market. He won a sweepstake against Whip, Mother Shipton and others at Lewes; and a match at Newmarket with Louisa; and also a match against Mr. Concanon's Knighted. In 1798 he won the Perworth Stakes at Brighthelm, beating Wrangler, Johnny, Rennington, Play or Pay, and two others. At Lewes he won a sweepstake against Whip and two more. He walked over for the King's plate at Canterbury, and won the city plate. In 1799, he won one hundred and twenty guineas at Lichfield, beating Robin Redbreast, Canon and four others; and a plate at Leicester.

The celebrated English Stallion



CITIZEN,

LATELY from England, in the ship Gosport, Captain Chamberlin. He was landed at Portsmouth, in Virginia, on the 26th of September last, in fine health and condition. Citizen is a most beautiful animal, stands five feet one inch high, has great grandeur and substance, is rich brown bay, with black legs, full of bone, perfectly sound, and has remarkable good action; descended from the best stock of horses in England, as will fully appear from his pedigree below, and was well known on the turf, having won nineteen different races, and the most of them four mile heats, beating the best horses in England, to wit, Mendoza, Bustard, Regulus, Roseland, Cavendish, Mayfly, and many other capital races. Mendoza beat the Duke of Bedford's Grey Diomed and Dragon—see the Racing Calendar for the year 1792, page 128 and 139. The same year Bustard beat Lord Grosvenor's Cayenne, his R. H. the Duke of York's Spankaway, and his R. H. the Prince of Wales's Whiskey; and several other fine horses—see page 9 and 34. Regulus was a most capital racer, having won seventeen races out of twenty-one, and the most of them four mile heats—he was got by Young Mrevelock, out of Citizen's dam.

PERFORMANCES.

CITIZEN first made his appearance on the turf in 1789, at Beverly, on Wednesday June 3d, then four years old; he won the Ladies plate of 50l. two mile heats, carrying 8 stone, beating Nightingale, four year old, 7 stone 12 pound.

Chesterfield, on Thursday, September 3, 50l. for all ages, heats twice round the course, Mr. Gorwood's bay colt Citizen by Paoclet, four year old, first the first heat, dead heat the second, and first the third, beating Dorinda, Florizel, Vision, Shaver and Thistle.

Leicester, Wednesday 16th of September, 50l. for all ages, two mile heats. Mr. Gorwood's b. c. Citizen by Paoclet, 4 year old, 8 stone 6 pound, first each heat, beating Vision, 4 year old, 8 stone, Doug, aged, 8 stone, and Tendeling, 3 year old, 8 stone 12 pound.

on Thursday, 17th, 50l. for 4 year old, 7 stone, 5 year old, 8 stone, 6 year old, 8 stone 6 pound, and aged, 8 stone, a winner of one plate, this year, carrying 3 pound extra, of two, 3 pound, of three, 4 pound, 4 mile heats, Mr. Gorwood's b. c. Citizen by Paoclet, first each heat, beating Dorinda and Eagle Dragon.

Manchester, May 23rd, 1790, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, 5 year old, fourth 1st heat, first 2d and 3d, beating Abbe Aule, 4 year old, Spangle, 3 year old, and Attraction, aged.

Newcastle, June 30th, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, first each heat, beating Amatus, 3 year old.

Bromsgrove, July 22d, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, dead heat first, 1st second and third, beating Benedick, 4 year old, and Sunflower, who was distances the first heat.

Litchfield, September 16th, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, fourth 1st heat, first the 2d and 3d, beating Harlot, aged, Florizel, 6 year old, and Merry Andrew, aged.

Shrewsbury, September 21st, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, third 1st heat, first the 2d and 3d, beating Evergreen, 5 year old, Labriar, 4 year old, Doubtful, 6 year old, Julia, 4 year old, and Charlotte, 4 year old.

Ludlow, Sept. 29th, 50l. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet (3 plates) 8 stone, 9 pound, beating Mr. Ladd's b. c. by Hightyver, 4 year old (2 plates) 7 stone 5 pound.

His performances in Sept. 1790, are astonishing; the 14th he ran 2 heats of 3 miles; the 10th 3 heats of 4 miles; the 21st 3 heats of 4 miles; the 20th 2 heats of 4 miles; and in the whole 38 miles in 15 days,

and that at three different race fields, which is unequalled in the annals of the turf.

Citizen by Paoclet, aged, third the 1st heat, first the 2d and 3d, beating Young Cicero and Harlot.

Newcastle, Staffordshire, July 5th, 50l. for all ages, 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, aged, 9st. 3lb. first each heat, beating Gill Flower, 5 yr. old, 8st. 1lb.

Knutsford, August 2d, 50lb. for 4 yr. old, 7st. 7lb. 5 yr. old; 8st. 2lb. 6 yr. old, 8st. 10lb. aged, 9st. a winner of one plate this year, carrying 3lb. extra, of two, 5lb. 4 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, aged, fourth the 1st heat, and first the 2d and 3d, beating Bergamot, 5 yr. old, Telescope, 6 yr. old, Lizard, 5 yr. old, Monse-Trap, 5 yr. old.

Chesterfield, August the 30th, 50l. for all ages, heats twice round the course, Citizen 9st. 3lb. first each heat, beating Lord Belfast's Magnolia, 8st. 11lb.

Doncaster, Sept. 15th, Citizen by Paoclet, 9st. 3lb. beat Lord Belfast's Magnolia, 8st. 11lb. 4 miles, for 500 gs.

Manchester, May 20th, 1793, a sweepstake of 20 gs. each, with 50 gs. given by the renters of the race-ground, 5 yr. old, a feather, 4 yr. 7st. 2lb. 5 yr. 8st. 2lb. 6 yr. 8st. 11lb. and aged horses 9st. mares and geldings allowed 2lb. 4 mile heats, thirteen subscribers, Citizen by Paoclet, aged, third the 1st heat, first the 2d and 3d, beating Roseland 5 yr. old, Mendoza 5 yr. Microscope 6 yr. old, Bustard 4 yr. Cavendish, aged, and Mayfly 4 yr. old.

Oxford, Aug. 22, 50l. given by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough, for 4 yr. old 7st. 7lb. 5 yr. old 8st. 7lb. 6 yr. 9st. and aged 9st. 4lb. 3 mile heats, Citizen by Paoclet, aged, first each heat, beating Accus 6 yr. old, and Mr. Annesley's Master of Arts, who was distanced the first heat.

Manchester, June the 9th, 1794, a sweepstake of 20 gs. each, to which was added 52 gs. by the renters of the race-ground, for all ages, 4 mile heats, 6 subscribers, Citizen by Paoclet, aged, first each heat, beating Lord Stamford's b. c. Weasel, 4 yr. old.

In order to give the public every information in my power of Citizen's superiority as a foal-getter, as well as a racer, I have thought proper to insert a paragraph from William Barksdale's letter, (the gentleman who purchased Citizen for me) and also another from Capt. Evan Bowen to Col. Hamilton dated London, 1st July, 1797, which plainly shews that Citizen was a favourite, and ranked with Hambletonian, the most favourite horse that ever appeared on the British turf.

Paragraph from William Barksdale's letter, London, August 5th, 1803: "After a long trial I have succeeded to get you one of the horses on your list, called Citizen, 18 years old—he is a most beautiful animal, his stock is running with very great success; and there are four of his colts that have won at different places this spring. He has covered 150 mares this season in Derbyshire, and is esteemed one of the surest foal-getters.—There is no horse in England getting better stock, Sir Peter excepted."

Paragraph of a letter from Evan Bowen, of London, to Col. Hamilton, of Norfolk, respecting the price of full bred fillies in England, got by Trumpeter, Duncannon, Skyscraper, Woodpecker, Anvil, Rockingham, Diomed and Little Devil; which were the horses on the list sent out to him to select a filly from. After making a statement of the different prices, agreeably to their ages and qualifications, he observes, "N. B. Hambletonian and Citizen are at this day the favourite horses in England, and the prices for their fillies, supposed to be the same as those above mentioned. Turf Coies-House, Tottenham's, Hyde Park Corner, London, 1st July, 1797."

PEDIGREE.

"The bay horse Citizen was bred by Mr. Gorwood, and got by Paoclet, a well bred son of Blank; his dam called Princess, by Turk; grand dam Fairy Queen, by Young Cade, great grand dam, Routh's Black Eyes, by Crab, out of the Werlack Galloway, by Snake, Bald Galloway, Curwin's Bay Barb, and was purchased by W. Barksdale."

A true extract from the Stud Book, JAMES WEATHLEBY, Proprietor of the Racing Calendar, London, 2d August, 1803.

Paoclet, the sire of Citizen, was bred by Lord Grosvenor, and was got by Blank; his dam White-neck by Crab, Godolphin Arabian, Conyer's Arabian, Curwin's Bay Barb, Marshal's Spot, Whiteleggs Chesnut, Lotter Barb, Old Ventner mare; Blank the sire of Paoclet, and grand sire of Citizen, was bred by Lord Godolphin, and got by the Godolphin Arabian; his dam the Little Hartley mare, got by Bartlett's Childers, out of Flying Whig, by Williams's Woodstock Arabian; his great grandam by the Saint Victor Barb, out of a daughter of Whynot, son of the Fenwick Barb.

These are sufficient to prove to the satisfaction of every person conversant with the turf, that Citizen as a racer was inferior to no horse in England, Hambletonian excepted; and as a foal-getter he has fully established himself, having stood at C. Smith's, Esq. at Rochdale, near Manchester, at ten guineas a mare, and one guinea to the groom; and being the sire of Dapple, Nautilus, Hotspur, Tucmos, Little Citizen, and many others, who have contended with success against the best horses in England.

CITIZEN will stand the ensuing season at my stable in the county of Halifax, twelve miles below the town, on the old road leading from Petersburgh to Tarborough, and will be let to mares at three guineas the single leap, paid at the time of covering; six guineas the season, which may be discharged by the payment of five guineas, if paid by the 20th of February, 1805; and ten guineas to ensure a mare to be with foal; half a dollar to the groom for each mare, to be paid at the stable door. If the property of any mare put by the insurance, be changed before the time of foaling, the person who put her will be charged with the full amount of the insurance. As any mare put to Citizen by the season, should die within the same, I will charge nothing; if she should live till the expiration of the season, and fail to be with

foal, she may the next year have the benefit of a season to him for half price or a single leap gratis, at the discretion of her owner. I have extensive pasturage for mares, separate apartments for those with or without colts, and my personal attention will be paid to them; and when ordered, will be fed with corn at the neighbourhood price; but I will not be responsible for escapes or accidents of any kind whatever. Servants sent with mares will be boarded free from charge.

The above letters, and several others from Mr. Barksdale, and one from Mr. Robert Openshaw, a merchant of Murrresborough, lately from England, who has frequently seen Citizen run, as he was raised within six miles of him, the calendars of England for each year whilst he was on the turf, and the general stud book, I have in my possession, free for the inspection of any person whatever; which will unquestionably prove that Citizen has come to this country as well recommended as a blood stallion, racer and foal-getter, as any horse ever did; and I flatter myself that my former customers, as well as many others, will feel themselves highly gratified in having it in their power to breed from so valuable a stallion.
