LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

AN ACT

To erect a light-house at the mouth of the Mississippi river, and also a light house at or near the pitch of Cape Look Out, in the state of North-Carolina; and a beacon at the north point of Saudy Hook.

BI: it enacted by the Senate and House of Pepresentatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That under the direction of the President of the United States, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury, to provide by contract, to be approved by the President, for building a light house at the mouth of the river Mississippt, in such site as the President of the United States may deem most proper for the convenience and accommodation thereof.

S.c. 2. And be it further enacted, That as soon as land sufficient shall be obtained at a reasonable price for the purpose and surisdiction of the land so to be obtained suall have been ceded to the United States by the state of North-Carolina, it shall be the daty of the Secretary of the Treatury, oprovide by contract, for building a light house on or hear the pitch of Cape Look Out, in the said State, which contract shall be approved by the President of the U. States, and it shall be the duty of said Secretary to famish the said light houses on Cape Look Out and the mouth of the Mississippi, with all necessary supplies, and also to agree for the salar ies or wages of the person or persons who may be appointed by the President for the superintendance and care of the same. And the President is hereby authorised to make such appointments.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars be, and is hereby appropriated for the purpose of defraying the charges and expenses which shall accrue in consequence of the two first sections of this act, to be paid out of any monies in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury, as soon as the fee of the soil shall have vested in the United States to cause a beacon to be erected on the north point of Sandy Hook, and the sum of two thousand dollars out of any unappropriated monies, is hereby appropriated for that purpose.

AN ACT

Supplementary to the act, entitled " An act relative to the election of President and Vice-President of the United States, and declaring the officer who shall act as Prement, in case of vacancies in the offices of President and Vice-President.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Re-

presentatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That whenever the amenument proposed during the present session of congress, to the constitution of the United States, respecting the manner of voting for the President and Vice-President or the United States, shall have been ratified by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states, the Secretary of State shall forthwith cause a notithree thereof to be made to the executives of every state; and shall also cause the same to be published in at least one of the newspagers printed in each state, in which the has of the United States are annually published: The executive authority of each state shall cause a transcript of the said notification to be delivered to the electors appointed for that purpose; who shall first thereafter meet in such state for the election of a President and Vice-President of the United States; and whenever the said electors shall have received the said transcript of notification, or whenever they shall meet more than five days subsequent to the publication of the ratification of the above mentioned amendment, in one of the newspapers of the state, by the Secretary of state, they shall vote for President and Vice-President of the United States, respectively, in the manner directed by the above mentioned amendment, and having made and signed three certificates of all the votes given by them, each of which certificates shall contain two distinct lists, one of the votes given for President, and the other, of the votes given for Vice-President: they shall seal up the said certificates, certifying on each, that lists of all the votes of such state given for President, and of all the votes iven for Vice-President, is contained there-& shall cause the said certificate to be transmitted and disposed of, and in every other tespect act in conformity with the provisions of the act to which this is a supplement. And every other provision of the act to which this is a supplement, and which is not virtually repealed by this act, shall extend and apply to every election of a President and Vice-President of the United States, made in conformity to the above mentioned amendment to the constitution of the United

And whereas, the above mentioned ahendment may be ratified by the legislatures three fourths of the states, and thereupon become immediately valid, to all intents and Arposes, as part of the constitution, on a the day fixed by law for the meeting of the electors in the several states, the electors shall not in every state be apprized of the said ratification, and may vote in a manner no longer conformable to the constitution as amended; whereby

several states might be deprived of their vote in the election of a President and Vice-President: for remedy whereof,

Sec. 2. Be be it further enacted, That the electors who shall be appointed in each state for the election of a President and Vice President of the United States, shall at every such election, unless they shall have received a transcript of the notification of the ratification of the above mentioned amendment to the constitution, or unless they shall meet more than five days subsequent to the publication of the said ratification by the Secretary of State, in one of the newspapers of the state, vote for President & Vice-President of the United States, in the following manner, that is to say; they shal! vote for two persons as President and Vice-President, in conformity with the first section of the second article of the Constitution. And in other respects act in conformity with the provisions of the act to which this is a supplement; and they shall likewise vote for one person as President, and for one person as Vice-President; in conformity with the above mentioned amendment of the constitution; and in other respects act in conformity with the provisions of the first section of this act. But those certificates only, of votes given for President and Vice-President of the United States, shall be opened by the President of the Senate, for the purpose of being counted, which shall contain the list or lists of votes given in conformity with the constitution, as in force on the day fixed by law for the meeting of the electors, by whom the said votes shall have been given.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That whenever, by the provisions of the second section of this act, it shall be the duty of the electors for any state to vote in conformity, both with the constitution, & of the proposed amendment thereto, the executive authority of such state shall cause six lists of the names of the electors of the state to be made and certified, and to be delivered to the said electors on or before the day fixed by law for them to meet and vote for President and Vice-President! and the said electors shall enclose one of the said lists in each of the certificates by them made and sealed, in conformity to the provisions of this act, and of the act to which this is a sup-

AN ACT For the relief of the heirs of John Haber-

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled. That the proper accounting officers of the treasury, in settling the accounts of John Habersham, late collector of the port of Savannah, be authorized to allow a charge of one thousand one hundred and eleven dollars and sixteen cents, being the balance of the additional duty of ten per cent, on goods, wares, and merchandize imported in foreign ships, but which in the commencement of the execution of the law of one thousand seven hundred & ninety, for the collection of duties on imports & tonnage, was not duly collected by him, owing to the distance which deprived him of early instructions from the treasury department; and also the further sum of one thousand dollars being the amount of a draft of Edward Price, factor of the United States for establishing trade with the Creek Indians for supplies advanced to the said factor which has not heretofore been credited on his ac
