Fevus Bazelais, Martial Besse; As well in our own name as in that of the people of Havti, who have legally constituted us faithful organs and interpreters of their will; in presence of the Supreme Being, bcfor whom all mankind are equal, and who has distributed so many siscies of creatures on the surface of the earth for the purpose of ma nifesting his glory and his power by the diversity of his work: In the presence of all nature by whom we we have been so long a time consider ed as our-cast children:

Do declare that the tenor of the the Empetor. present constitution is the spontanehearts and the general will of our coastituents; and we submit it to the sanction of H. M. the I'mperor, Jacques D-ssalines, our deliverer to receive its speedy and entire exe eution.

Preliminary Declaration.

ART. J. The people inhabiting the Island formerly called St. Do mingo, hereby agree to form them selves into a free State. sovereign and independent of any other power in the universe, undor the name of Empire of Havti.

2. Slavery is forever abolished.

3. The citizens of Havi are bro thers at home, equality in the eye of the law is incontestably acknowledged; and there cannot exist any titles, advantages or pri vileges, other than those necessarily resulting from the consideration and reward of services rendered to liber ty and indepen ence.

4. The law is the same to all, whether it punishes, or whether it

6. Property is sacred, its violation shall be severely prosecuted.

5. The law has no retroactive effect

7. The quality of citizen of Havti is lost by emigration and naturaliza tion in foreign countries, and by condemnation to corporal or discrerefupunishments. The first case carries with it the punishment of death and e. fiscation of property.

8. Thequality of citizen is suspen d d in consequence of bankruptcies and failures.

9. No person is worthy of being a Haytian who is not a good father, a good son a good husband, and especially a good sold er.

10. Fathers and mothers are not permitted to disinherit their children. 11. Every Citizen must possess a mechanic art.

12. No white man, of whatsoever nation he may be, shall put his loo on this territory with the title ci master or proprietor, neither shall he in future acquire any property therein.

13. The preceding article cannot in the smallest degree affect while women who have been natura lized Haytians by Government, not does it extend to children arrady born or that may be born of the sai. women. The Germans and Polan clers naturalized Haylians by Go vernment are also comprized in the dispositions of the present article.

14. All exception of colour amon; the children of one and the same family, of whom the chief magis trate is the father, being necessarily to cease, the Haytians shall hence forward be known only by the gene ric appellation of Blacks.

Of the Empire:

15. The Empire of Havti, is one and indivisible. Its territory is distributed into six military divisions

16. Each military division shall be communded by a general of divi-

17. These generals of division shall be independent of one another and shall correspond directly with the Emperor or with the general is chief appointed by his mujesty.

18. The following Islands are interral parts of the l'impire : viz. S. mona, La l'ortue, La ; na ve, Committee, La Brune, L'isle-in-V gringe adjecent Islands.

Of the Government.

19. The Government of Hayti is entrusted to a first Magistrate, who assumes the title of Emperor and commander in chief of the army.

20. The people acknowledge for Emperor and Commander in Chief of the army, Jacques Dessalines, the avenger and deliverer of his fellow citizens. The title of Majesty is conferred upon him, as, well as upon his august spouse the Empress.

21. The person of their majestics is sacred and inviolable.

22. The State will appropriate a fixed annual allowance to her Majesty the Empress, which she will con inue to enjoy even after the tlecease of the Emperor, as princess

23. The crown is elective, not

24. There shall be assigned by the State an annual income to the children acknowledged by his Majesty

25. The male children acknowous and invariable expression of our ledged by the Emperor shall be obliged in the same manner as other citize s, to pass successively from grade to grade, with this only dif. firence, that their entrance into ser. vice shall begin at the fourth demigrade, from the period of their birth.

> 26. The Emperor, designates, in he manner he may judge expedient, he person who is to be his successor either befire or after his death.

27. A suitable provision shall be made by the state to that successor from the moment of his accession to

28. The Emperor, and his sucressors shall, in no case and under no pretext whatsoever, have the right of attaching to their persons any particular or privileged body, whether as guards, of honour, or un.

der any other denomination. 29. Every successor deviating from the dispositions of the preceding ar. sicle, or from the principles consecrated in the present constitution, shall be considered and declared in a state of werfare against the so-

In such a case, the Counsellors of state will assemble in order to pronounce his removal, and to chuse me among themselves who shall be judged the most worthy of replacing aim; and if it should hap; en that the said successor oppose the execuion of this measure authorised by Law, the Generals, councellers of State, shall appeal to the people and the army, who will immediately give 4. maintain Liberty.

30. The Emperor makes, seals, and promulgates the laws; appoints and revokes at will, the Ministers, the General in Chief of the Army, he Councillors of State, the Gener-Is and other agents of the Empire, the land and sea officers, the memhers of the local administrations, the Commissaries of Government near he tribunals, the judges, and other public functionaries.

31. The Emperor directs the reccipts and expenditures of the State, I su veys the Mint, of which he alone orders the emission, and fixes the weight and the model.

32. To him alone is reserved the 1 7. It cannot be entered but in case power of making peace or war, to maintain political intercourse, and to form treaties.

33. He provides for the interior saftty and for the defence of the State ; and distributes at pleasure the

sea and land forces. \$4. In case of conspiracies manifishing themselves against the safety of the State, against the Constitution r against his person, the Emperor shall cause the authors or accomplices to be arre ted and tried before a pecial Council.

.35. His Majesty has alone the ticht to absolve a criminal or to commute his punishment.

36. The Emperor shall never form any enterprize with the view of making conques's, nor to disturb the seace and the interior administration of foreign colonies.

37. Every public act shall be made

39. There shall be in the empire two Ministers and a Secretary of State. The Minister of finance having the department of the interior. and the Minister of war having the marine department.

40-14. [Interior regulations respecting the ministry.]

Of the Tribunals.

45. No one can interfere with the right which every individual has of being judge I amicably by arbitrators of his own chusing, whose decisions shall be acknowledged legal.

46. There shall be a justice of peace in each commune, Any suit amounting to more than one hundred dollars shall not come within his cognizance. And when the parties cannot conciliate themselves at his tribunal, they may appeal to the tribunals of their res; ective districts.

47. There shall be six tribuna's established in cities herein designated, viz. at St. Marc, the Cape, Port au-Prince, Aux-Cayes, Lanse a-Veaux and Fort-de-Paix. The Emperor determines their organization, their number, their competence and the territory forming the district of each. These tribunals take commizance of all affairs purely civil.

48. Military crimes are submitted to special councils and to particular forms of judgment.

49. Particular laws shall be made for the national transactions, and respecting the civil officers of the

52. The state does not provide for the maintenance of any religious institution, nor of any minister.

Of the Administration.

53. There shall be in each military division a principal administration, whose organization and inspection belong essentially to the minister of finance.

General Dispositions.

ART. I. To the Emperor and Empress belong the choice, the sa-Lary, and the maintenance of the persons composing their court.

2. After the deceuse of the reigntheir whole strength and assistance thing Emperor, when a revision of the constitution shall have been judged necess ry, the council of state will assemble for that purpose, such shall be presided by the oldest member.

3. The crimes of high treason, the dilapidations of the n inisters and generals, shall be judged by a spe cial council, called and presided by the Emperor.

5. No person shall be ind, e without having been I guly heard ithis defence.

6. The house of every chizen is an inviolable asylum.

9. Every judgment to which the pain of death or corporal punishment is annexed, shall not be carried into execution until it has been confirmed by the Emperor.

10. Theft shall be punished according to the circumstances which may have preceded, accompanied, or followed it.

11. Every stranger inhabiting the territory of Hayti shall be, equally with Haytians, subject to the correctional and criminal laws of the coun-

12. All property which formerly belonged to any white Frenchman is contestibly and of right confiscated to the use of the state.

13. Every Haytian, who, having purchased property from a white Frenchman, may have paid part of the purchase money stipulated in the Raleigh, June 24th, A. La

14. Marriage is an act purely civil, and authorised by the Govern ment.

15. The law authorises divorce in all cases which shall have been previously provided for and determined. 16. A particular law shall be issued concerning children born out of wed-

17. Respect for the chiefs, subordination and discipline are rigorously necessary.

18. A penal code shall be pub lished and severely observed.

19. Within each military division a public school shall be established for the instruction of youth.

20. The national colours shall be black and red.

11. Agriculture, as it is the first and the most noble, and the most useful of all the arts, shall be honored and protected.

22. Commerce, the second source of prosperity of states, will not admit of any impediment : it ought to be favoured and special'y protected.

23. In each military division a tribonal of commerce shall be formed whose members shall be chosen by the Emperor from the class of merchants.

24. Good faith and integrity in ommercial operations , shall be reagiously maintained.

25. The government assures safety and protection to neutral nations and friends who may be desirous of establishing a commercial intercourse with this island, they conforming to the regulations and cus-

coms of the country. 26. The counting houses and the merchandize of foreigners shall be under the safeguard and guarantee

of the state. 27. There shall be national festivals for celebrating Independence, the birth-day of the Emperor and his august s ouse, that of Agriculture
