

With the intelligence of the march of the Russian troops, we have received the following news in letters from Lemberg in Galicia, dated the 24th of August:

Generals Souch & Whyroter have been successively sent here by the court of Vienna, to direct the march of the Russians. Their army is divided into two bodies, one of which takes its route through eastern Galicia, and the other by the northern, towards Lublin and Cracovia; the last body has not yet entered Galicia. The first arrived on the 25th of August, at Brody; it marches in six columns. It is confirmed that a third body of Russian troops are actually concentrated at Wilna, in Lithuania, and is to be followed by several others. The court of Berlin having refused a passage through its states, the corps of the army of Wilna will continue its route thro' Galicia.

SEPT. 16.

The Austrians have already taken possession of a great part of Bavaria. All the country situated between the Inn and the Isar is overrun with their troops. Gen. Klenau, who commands the corps of the army which passed the Inn on the 8th September, is about to transfer his head quarters to Munich. The principal cities near the Danube or on the borders of the river, between Strubing, Passau Landshut, Vilshoff and other places have already an Austrian garrison.

FRANKFORT, SEPT. 11.

Our last letters are of the 3d September; they give the news that on the 3d a general order of the day announced to the army that the new commanders of the troops have been officially nominated. It is therein said, that the Emperor will repair in person to the army, having under him General Mack and Count de Greenville. His Majesty will set off for Lintz on the 3d September. On the same day Archduke and the other Generals are to repair to the armies in which they are employed. The Archduke Charles is appointed Commander in chief of the Austrian army in Italy and in the Tyrol. The Archduke John, his brother, as his assistant in the command; and Baron de Zach is to perform the functions of chief of the General Staff, a post which he has already occupied in the army of General Melas, under whom he served in the battle of Marengo, where he was taken prisoner; the General Baron de Hufenburg is also to have a superior post in the army of the Tyrol, under the orders of the Archduke Charles.

The chief command of the army in upper Austria is given to the Archduke Ferdinand, the son of the present sovereign of Erising and of the Ardenau, cousin german to the Emperor. General Mayer is chief of the staff of his army.

During the absence of the Emperor, the Elector of Salzburg, his brother, is charged with the direction of business.

SEPT. 14.

Letters from Vienna announce that a part of the baggage of his Majesty the Emperor and of the Imperial and Royal Highnesses the Archdukes, is already sent off for the army. The Monarch will first repair to the camp of Wals.

PARIS, SEPT. 12.

We readily believe in this country that it will be very difficult for the Helvetic confederation to maintain its neutrality in the new continental war which is about commencing.

The greatest activity prevails in all the cantons for raising the quota of men destined to protect the armed neutrality and to occupy the frontiers. The gendarmes of most of the cantons have been convoked to deliberate on the circular letter of the landamans relative to this object, and to determine the number of troops of which it shall be composed. The landamans has given order to draw the exact limits of Switzerland by the establishment of posts throughout all the country of the Grisons, from whence he will be able to send detachments to the frontiers of Tyrol, Vorarlberg and Italy.

The official journal of this day announces that "the Emperor of Germany, without any previous negotiation or explanation, and without a declaration of war, has invaded Bavaria. The elector has retired to Witzsburg, where the whole of the Bavarian army is assembled."

SEPT. 24.

Cardinal Fesch, our minister plenipotentiary at Rome, has presented to the Holy Father, in the name of his Imperial and Royal Majesty, eight magnificent pieces of tapestry representing scenes from the new Testament, two superb carpets of exquisite workmanship, two chandeliers of the greatest beauty, and a service of plate for the table.

SEPT. 25.

Marshal Massena, general in chief of the army of Italy, arrived on the 10th Fruidior at the head quarters of Villa France; the day following he visited the fortifications of Mantua, and in the evening departed for Valleggio, where he will establish his head quarters.

Gen. rai Jourdan passed safely through Lyons without stopping, on his way from Italy to Paris.

SEPT. 27.

Imperial Decree. St. Cloud, 21 complementary day year 13. We, Napoleon, Emperor of the French, King of Italy, have decreed and do decree what follows:

There shall be formed three bodies of an army of reserve. The first shall have its head quarters at Boulogne, and shall be commanded by Marshal Brune; it shall extend from the Somme to the Scheldt, and shall comprise the departments of the Somme, of the Pas-de-Calais, of the Nord and of the Ly... The second shall assemble at Mayence, and shall be commanded by the senator Marshal Lefebvre; it shall comprise the departments of the 25th and 26th military divisions. The third shall unite at Strasburg, and shall be commanded by the senator Marshal Kellerman; it shall comprise the departments of the 25th and 26th military divisions. All the corps destined to make a part of these three bodies of reserve shall be carried to the complement of war by means of the reserve. There shall be formed at Rennes a flying camp of grenadiers, under the orders of General of Brigade Boyer. There shall be formed a second flying camp of grenadiers at the town Napoleon, under the orders of a general of brigade. There shall be formed a third flying camp of grenadiers at Alexandria, department of Tarento, under the orders of a general of brigade. There shall be attached to each of these bodies a division of light horse artillery. These bodies are destined to march wherever their presence may be necessary. The minister of war is charged with the execution of the present decree.

NAPOLEON.

An imperial decree orders that there shall be formed a corps of horse voltiers of the three last years, at the rate of six for each department, to be taken from among those who shall offer themselves voluntarily; or in default of such, to be designated by the prefect. The Voltiers must be of sound constitutions, and must have of their own or from their relations, a secure revenue of 200 francs a year.

His Majesty the Emperor and King set off for the army on Tuesday last. The Empress set off with the Emperor, and is to be followed by Mr. Tallierand, the minister for foreign affairs.

A Paris paper of the 23d September, contains a very lengthy exposition of the reciprocal conduct of France and Austria, from the peace at Luneville to the present at Lincevi. It is addressed by the minister of foreign affairs in the Senate on the 23d of September. The substance of it is as follows:

"After such an act on the part of the court of Vienna, the Emperor could have nothing more to ask of it. It became evident that even that Congress, which proceeded with such an impious policy, and with views so visibly hostile to France, was only a new scene laid for the purpose of Austria, irresolutely decided on war, and that she was even no longer free to return to them. The exchange of all peace evident; provided that a part of the sums granted to the French ministry to serve such ends upon the continent, was

power which had just transferred with her alliance, could no longer spare the blood of her subjects, the price of which she just received.

"All further explanation with the Court of Vienna, being thus become impossible; the way of arms is henceforward the only one compatible with honour.

"Let England applaud herself upon having at length found allies; let her rejoice that blood is about to flow upon the continent, let her flatter herself that her own will be spared; let her hope to find her safety in the discord of other states. Her joy will be of short duration, her hopes will be vain, and the day is not far distant when the rights of nations will be at length avenged.

"The Emperor, obliged to repel an unjust aggression which he has in vain endeavoured to prevent, has been constrained to suspend the execution of his first designs. He has withdrawn from the shores of the ocean those old bands so victorious, and he marches at their head. He will not lay down his arms before he has obtained full and entire satisfaction, and complete security both for his own states and those of his allies."

General Assembly. HOUSE OF COMMONS. Monday, Nov. 25.

Mr. Jones, from the balloting for a Governor for the ensuing year, reported that Nathaniel Alexander, Esq. was duly elected; he having 108 votes and Col. Benjamin Williams es. Col. Taylor's name had been dropped.

The resignation of Thos. Childs, as Brigadier-General of the 11th Brigade of the 4th division was received and accepted.

The Speakers of the two Houses were directed by resolution, to dispatch an Express to Nathaniel Alexander, informing him that he is elected Governor.

The resignation of John Colwell, Major of the Sampson regiment of Militia, was received from the Senate and accepted.

A committee was appointed to take into consideration all applications made for the collection of the arrears of taxes.

Mr. Hay, from the committee to whom was referred the bill to amend and supply the deficiency of the several acts in force, directing how deeds of gift and bills of sale of slaves shall be authenticated and perpetuated, reported the bill with amendments.

The following bills were presented, and passed their first reading: By Mr. Hay, a bill to amend the act for the better regulation of the

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
