

...ous time which comes to the present time; as the word *hereafter* means any portion of future time which commences immediately after the present. With respect to the word *thereafter*...

most strictly, and in its fullest extent against the power intended to be restrained. This 9th section of the bill of rights, therefore, restrains the Legislature from passing any law which shall subject a free man to be tried for any crime, except by a jury as heretofore used. It may be said, that we have given to the county courts the power of trying persons charged with petit larcenies, assaults and batteries, &c. but these are, in the language of our laws, misdemeanors, and not crimes. To try persons charged with crimes, the jury must be called out upon the district principle, that is to say, from a plurality of counties, because the framers of the constitution have provided they should be tried from a knowledge that, in this way, men of the best capacities are obtained, free from prejudice in respect to the person or cause to be tried. This, Mr. S. said, was the construction which our ancestors, before the Revolution and since, gave to these offences. To prove this, he read some laws passed before the Revolution, and the court law of '77. In conclusion, Mr. S. said, if he had shewn that the trial by jury before the Revolution, was upon the district principle, as at present; and if he had shewn the true meaning of the word crime, and that the county courts had not, and could not have, cognizance of crimes, then he had proved the provisions of the bill on the table unconstitutional, and that, therefore, the house had not the power of passing it into a law.

**TREASURER'S REPORT.**

To the Honorable the General Assembly of the State of North-Carolina.

GENTLEMEN,

BY way of making to you the Statement which is annually required of the Public Treasurer by Law, I have the honor here to submit the following Report, viz.

The Receipts at the Public Treasury of North-Carolina, from the first day of November, 1805, to the first day of November, 1806, including Arrearages, the Public Taxes of every description, and the Cotton-Gin Tax, amount to Twenty-six Thousand, nine Hundred and fifty five Pounds, twelve Shillings and eight-pence (£26,955 12 8) which sum, when added to the Balance remaining in the Treasury on the first day of November, 1805, to-wit, to Forty two Thousand, nine Hundred & seventeen Pounds, fourteen Shillings & a penny, as reported to the last General Assembly, makes an aggregate amount of Sixty-one Thousand eight Hundred & seventy-three Pounds, six shillings & nine-pence (£69,873 6 9). From this sum total, or aggregate amount, Disbursements have been made, within the period first above mentioned (say from November, 1805, to November, 1806,) including the money burnt by the last Assembly, to amount of Twenty-eight Thousand, three Hundred and thirty-four Pounds, thirteen Shillings and one penny (£28,334 13 1). The vouchers for all which are delivered over to the Comptroller, and passed to the Treasurer's Credit, and are by him held ready for the inspection of the Committee of Finance.

Take this Disbursement or Expenditure from the sum total or aggregate amount, above mentioned, and a Balance of Forty-one Thousand, one Hundred and thirty-eight Pounds, thirteen Shillings and eight-pence (£41,538 13 8) is left in the Public Treasury, on the said first day of November, 1805, yet to be accounted for.

According to custom, the most worn of the Bills forming this Balance or Remainder, will be selected and held in readiness to be burnt, in case the Legislature shall so direct.

The Receipts at the Treasury for Lands entered and paid for, amount, from the first day of November, 1805, to the first day of November, 1806, to the sum of Three Thousand, six Hundred and forty-three Pounds, five Shillings and ten-pence (£3,643 5 10). These Receipts, or this Amount, however, being fully and completely covered by Certificate and other Vouchers, do in no wise affect the Public Treasurer's general Account of the Taxes, &c. the Balance of which is as above stated.

From the foregoing it will be seen that the Expenditure at the Treasury, from November, 1805, to November, 1806, reduced the Balance reported to the last Assembly, to the small sum of Fourteen Thousand, five Hundred and eighty-three Pounds one Shilling: Exceeding which, no appropriation for any purpose whatever can be made, without first increasing the amount of the Revenue, by raising the Public Taxes, or otherwise; provided the Expenses of the current and future years shall equal those of the last.

Pursuant to the directions of the Legislature, I forwarded, on the 28th of October last, to the Cashier of the Bank of the United States, Twenty five Hundred Dollars, received on account of the Interest and Reimbursement of the Stocks of the Funds of the United States, standing on the Books of the Commissioner of Loans for North-Carolina, to the credit of this State, with a request that the same should be invested in Eight or Three per cent. Stocks, for the use of North-Carolina. The due receipt of this remittance has been acknowledged, and in the course of the present month, I expect Warrants of Transfer for the Stocks purchased with it: And about the same time, I am to receive other Warrants, transferring for the use of North-Carolina, and to the Books here, Fifty-n Hundred other Dollars of Eight per cent. Stock, which I have likewise bargained for, and for which I am to pay out of the remainder of the Monies in my hands, received in Interest and reimbursement as aforesaid. These Purchases would have been sooner effected, but for the difficulty of procuring Notes of the Northern Banks equal to the making them.

Agreeably to the provisions of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act to relieve certain of the inhabitants of Mecklenburg county, and other citizens of this State," the Treasurer of the University of North-Carolina has transferred to me, as Public Treasurer, and in trust for the use of the State, Eleven Hundred and twenty three dollars, thirty-two cents of unredeemed Six per cent. Stock, equal at 96 1/2 per cent. the price at which it was lately purchased in Philadelphia, to Five Hundred and sixty-one Pounds, thirteen Shillings and two-pence, North-Carolina Currency. This sum, when added to the amount of value of the Stocks heretofore transferred to the State by the University, makes a total, and is equal in Currency to Three Thousand three Hundred and seventy-three Pounds seventeen Shillings and six-pence, and covers all the claims reported to me by the Treasurer of that Institution, as coming within the description of the Act above recited, and me to be provided for.

Warrants transferring to the Books here, Three Thousand, three Hundred Dollars of Eight per cent. Stock of the Funds of the United States, purchased with the Remittance mentioned in the Public Treasurer's Report to the last General Assembly, have been received during the recess, and have been placed to the credit of this State, increasing her Stock, stated in the Report aforesaid, to that further amount.

For the further information of the Legislature, I herewith submit a Statement shewing, at one view, the amount of the different denominations of the Stocks of the Funds of the United States, which are held and owned by the State of North-Carolina. And have the honour to remain,
