ELECTIONS.

We learn that John Stanly is elected to Congress from the Newbern district, by 185 votes. The majorities in the several counties were as follow:

Archibald M'Bride is elected for the Fayetteville district. The following state of the poll is from the Fayetteville paper. We doubt its correctness in respect to Montgomery county...

The Halifax Journal, without giving any return of the votes from the several counties, states that Wm. Kennedy is elected for the Tarborough district.

Willis Alston is re-elected for the Halifax district by a majority of 489 votes. The whole number of votes given in was 3,049, of which Mr. Alston had 1769 and Mr. Mason 1280.

Lemuel Sawyer is re-elected for the district of Edenton. A few hundred votes were given to Mr. W. Murree.

James Cochran is elected for the Caswell district. The following is a state of the poll. Both candidates, we believe, are Republican:
