Before the publication of our next paper, the great question which now agitates the whole community from Maine to Missouri, will be decided in this state. It is indeed, an important one, and on its result depends the happiness and prosperity of the country.

On Monday last commenced the semi-annual Examination of the Students of our Academy. On Tuesday evening, the Pupils of Mr. Geneke on the Piano made an Exhibition at his Concert Room, which gave great satisfaction to a crowded audience.

The improvement of the Students in both Departments of the Academy, fully equalled the expectations of the Trustees and all who attended the Examination.

An abstract of the Report of the Trustees will be found in our preceding columns.

The Exercises of the Academy, will be resumed, as usual, under the care of Dr. McPheeters, and the same able Assistants, on the first Monday in January next.

University Warrants.—We are concerned to learn from the Tennessee papers, that the prayer of the petition of the Trustees of our University to the Legislature of that State, that certain escheated Military Land Warrants might be adjudicated and passed for her benefit, was, on the 6th ult. rejected in the House of Representatives by a vote of 23 to 16.

The Nashville Whig notices an extraordinary circumstance which took place while Mr. Maury's Resolution on this subject was under consideration. This Resolution provided that the Commissioners of West Tennessee should proceed to adjudicate the warrants belonging to our University so soon as it should be certified to him by our Secretary of State, under the authority of the General Assembly, that we had ceased issuing military warrants for the services of the officers and soldiers of our continental line, and that the muster-rolls are forever closed.

Before the question was taken on this resolution, Mr. Balch offered an amendment, providing that said warrants should be adjudicated so soon as

the Trustees of the University of N. Carolina should assign, to each member of the General Assembly one thousand acres of said warrants.

After this proposition had been read by the clerk, Mr. Grundy, Mr. Brady, and several other gentlemen mildly and persuasively requested Mr. Balch to withdraw it; stating that they had no doubt the gentleman intended it as a jest. Mr. B. positively refused to do so, and proceeded to make a speech, not in favor of his resolution, but against the claim of the Trustees of the University, of which he spoke in very harsh terms. It was then intimated to him by Mr. Polk, Mr. Grundy, and others, that the House knew what was due to its dignity, and had the power to punish any contempt which might be offered to it.

A Riot.—A scene of tumult and disorder lately took place at Providence, R. Island; which reflects disgrace on the police of a place, which has heretofore been distinguished for its correct morals. It commenced on Sunday evening the 17th ult. in the centre of the town, between the labouring white people and the negroes, and was resumed the next night, and ended in the entire destruction of a small hamlet in the northern suburbs of the town, inhabited principally by the black people.

BANK ROBBERY.—On the night of the 13th ult. the Huntsville (Alabama) Bank, was robbed of notes to the amount of between twenty-five and twenty-nine thousand dollars. A reward of \$2,000 is offered for the apprehension and conviction of the villain who committed the theft. The robbery was committed by knocking the Cashier down as he was passing from the banking-room to that of the directors, with the bundle of notes. The door of the passage had been left unlocked, and as the cashier was going as above stated from one room to the other, with a candle in his hand, the passage door was forced open by the robber, who gave the cashier a severe blow, seized the money and escaped.

The great Dam which was constructed at Black Rock, at an expense of upwards of a hundred thousand dollars, was broken during a storm on Wednesday, the 20th ult.

The last Fayetteville paper, contains the following remarks on the state of their market:

Cotton.—This article has appeared in considerable quantities. Prime qualities are bought eagerly at 13 to 13 1/2. The demand at present is quite animated. Good cotton is much wanted for the Northern Factories.

Flour.—The quantity at market quite limited, and sales are more readily made but still dull.

Groceries.—Coffee is plenty, and dull. Sugar is not abundant; but the demand as yet is not great. Molasses, very plenty and dull. We have had some arrivals of Liverpool salt lately. The supply may be considered fair.

Dry Goods.—Sufficiently abundant to meet any demand. Supplies are constantly arriving. We are glad to see that there are a number of country merchants engaged in making their purchases; some of them from a distance, but we are more particularly gratified to hear them express their entire satisfaction with the qualities, and prices of goods in market, though the quality is abundantly equal to meet any demand, yet there will be found some advantage in making an early selection.

Stop the Villain.

ON Tuesday night last, NATHAN G. The negro belonging to me, is named ANTHONY; he is a low thick-set fellow, about 24 years of age, and will weigh about 160 lbs. The wife and three children of the negro, lived with Mr. Thomas Boon of Edgecombe County, and was no doubt coaxed away by said Brazil. The woman's name is Nancy, and her children are called Jarman, Charissa, and Henry. The oldest boy Jarman has a mark on the left side of his neck occasioned by a burn, which may lead to a detection. All three of the children are yellow complected, as is the case with the mother.

BRAZIL is nearly 30 years of age, with grey eyes, sandy hair inclined to curl, speaks in a fierce tone of voice, and is of slender stature. It is the interest as well as duty, of every virtuous member of society to aid in the apprehension of this consummate villain. To those who themselves have children, I need urge no stimulus to assist in restoring an innocent though deluded young creature to the bosom of her family.
