MEASUREMENTS: From the Family Visitor of January 8th inst. we derive the following information respecting the views of Episcopalians in England and America, upon the subject of

Bible Societies, which will, no doubt, be interesting to many of your readers.

In the United Kingdom of Great Britain, a large portion of the Bishops are members of Bible Societies, and since the establishment of the British & Foreign Bible Societies in 1804, thirty two Bishops of the Established Church have publicly supported, while only seven have openly opposed, these noble institutions.

Of the American Bishops, only two are found in the ranks of opposition. All the others, as far as their sentiments are known, are decided and zealous friends to Bible Societies, as they are usually conducted. Bishop Moore is President of the Bible Society of Virginia. Similar Officers are now, or were held recently, in other Bible Societies, by Bishops White, Kemp, Griswold and Chase.

In 1814, the AMERICAN BISHOPS ASSEMBLED IN CONVENTION, addressed a Pastoral Letter to the Episcopalians in the United States, in which they say in reference to Bible Societies, "we should conceive ourselves as wanting, on this occasion, to the high duties of our stations, were we to neglect to bear our testimony in favor of this energetic effort for the disappointment of the wicked designs of infidelity, for the extending of the influence of pure and undefiled religion, and finally, for the carrying into effect of those gracious promises of Heaven, which will not have been accomplished; until the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea."
