

PEACE PARTY BATTLE
On the 2nd inst. (says the Boston Patriot) the brig Dispatch, owned by Cornelius Coolidge and Francis J. Oliver, of this town, from Cadiz was captured near the Light House by the privateer Castigator, of Salem. As soon as news of her capture reached town, two boats, without authority, were fitted out by Coolidge & Oliver, with about 22 armed men in each, with the avowed intention of re-capturing the brig. The boats proceeded down and met the brig coming up under easy sail. When the privateersmen saw the boats making for the brig they went on board and supplied the prize master and crew with ammunition. The privateer then laying close by the brig hailed the boats several times, and ordered them to keep off—the people on board made no answer. The privateer, it is said, then fired at the boats; it being not returned she desisted—the boats run close along side the brig, when the crew on board of her commenced a fire on the boats, which was promptly returned. The boats then boarded and took possession of the brig. Immediately after the contest the brig and the privateer were brought too by the commandant of Fort Independence. The brig was delivered up to the collector of this port, and the privateer permitted to proceed on her cruise. No injury was done by the exchange of shots.

It is worthy of remark, that the owners of the Dispatch and the Castigator, are all decided "FEDERALISTS of the true Boston stamp."

The examination before the Hon. District Court of Cornelius Coolidge & Francis J. Oliver, for rescuing by an armed force the brig Dispatch, owned by them, from the privateer Castigator, of Salem, was yesterday terminated; and they were recognized with surety to answer the charge before the next Circuit Court in October. Their counsel contended that if any offence was committed, the U. S. Courts had not the jurisdiction, it being within the limits of the county of Suffolk, and that the facts proved did not constitute an offence, the cognizance of which the constitution or laws of the U. S. had expressly defined and given to the Federal Courts. But they contended further, that the rescuing party were not proved to have knowledge, that the captors acted under the authority of the U. States; and, therefore had a right to presume them unauthorized; that their going with an armed force, to ascertain the fact, was a reasonable precaution.

The District Attorney in an able investigation of the maritime jurisdiction of the U. S. Courts endeavored to show, that the present case was clearly and exclusively within it.

The Hon. Judge in giving his opinion, observed that he was well aware of the importance of keeping his mind free from any premature impressions on points, that might at a future trial be open to both parties for a more solemn decision by a court, of which he would necessarily be a member. He said, that the rescue of a prize from a private armed vessel of the U. S. duly commissioned, was clearly a contravention of the laws of the nation; consequently an infraction of that portion of sovereignty, which the constitution assigned to the General Government. He did not deem it material, whether the charge contained in the warrant was technically correct or not. We give only a concise outline of his very judicious and impartial remarks.

After the defendants were recognized, on enquiry being made for the witnesses, who had testified on behalf of the U. S. that they might be recognized as usual, information was given, that some of them had during the trial been arrested by the State authority to answer for their conduct before the State courts. The Hon. Judge expressed a strong disapprobation of such a hasty procedure, and observed, that it was by no means the proper mode of ascertaining and deciding the right of the parties, in that stage of the investigation.

The words were "practically and feloniously took, &c." as near as we remember them.

His Excellency Governor Hawkins returned to this city on Tuesday last, after visiting and examining the whole of our Sea coast, from Occacoek to New Inlet; the result of which will, no doubt, be forthwith communicated to the Secretary of War.

Colonel Wellhorn, we understand, has received orders to march with his troops from Salisbury, to Fort Hawkins, to be in readiness to go against the Creek Indians, in aid of the Militia of Georgia.

The second half of the present session of the Raleigh Academy will commence on Monday the 23rd instant.

From a General Order of the Governor of New-York, a militia force, which will probably amount to ten thousand men, has been ordered out to serve for 8 months. It is probable, from so large a levy having been put in requisition, that some extensive operations against the enemy's lines are about to take place, in which the whole of our regular forces will be employed; in consequence of which the militia are drafted, to supply the defences and garrison the posts on the frontier from which the regulars will have been withdrawn. We hope, before the end of this campaign, that a general occupation of the territory of the enemy adjoining our line will put an end to the petty and vexatious incursions he is now making in that quarter. We have no question but a part of our army at least will have their winter quarters at Montreal, if not beyond it.

The President of the United States left the City of Washington on Monday the 9th instant, for Montpelier, his seat in Orange county, Virginia.

General Armstrong left the seat of Government, on his way to New York, and thence to the Northern Frontier, on Tuesday evening the 10th inst.

General Dearborn arrived at his seat in Roxbury (Mass.) on Wednesday the 4th inst.

Edward Wier, Esq. of Boston, is appointed Consul of the United States at Riga. We understand he embarks immediately with dispatches for our Commissioners at St. Petersburg.

It is said that Capt. Geo. Crownshield, Fr. of Salem, has offered to go in a Brig to Halifax, at his own expense, to bring home the remains of the brave Capt. Lawrence.

Two persons have been taken up at New London and committed, on suspicion of having held a secret Correspondence with Commodore Hardy.

A Bill has passed the British House of Commons, to extend the Charter of the East India Company, for twenty years; and to grant them the exclusive trade to China in that time!

A MODERN BARGAIN.
"I will give you Norway—I Denmark consents, well and good—I will try to find means to pacify her. If she does not, it is no matter. I will take Norway from her, and consider her an enemy." COUNTERFEITERS.—A gang of Counterfeiters have been detected at Gaidhall, (Vt.) viz. Mark Winslow, Isaac Grosvenor, John Lamb, Levi Noble, Walter Beckland, and Ishiel Gargill, have been examined, and committed. They had in their possession \$0,000 dollars in spurious bills.

Another gang, or perhaps a branch of the same, have been apprehended in Saratoga and Schenectady, upon whom not only counterfeit bills but counterfeit dollars and eagles to a large amount have been found.

An eastern pamphlet has made its appearance, recommending, in substance a separation of the states. Neither the author's nor the printer's name is affixed to it. It is by this dark secrecy of names, by this assassin like conduct, that the union is to be cut to pieces without certainly knowing the flagitious enemy. If the object of this anti-union pamphlet were a legitimate one, the author ought to have signed his real name to it. But treason always at first makes its strides in the dark.

POSTSCRIPT.
British still in the Rappahannock.

After our paper was closed yesterday, we were indulged by a respected friend with the perusal of a letter from Rappahannock, dated on the 15th, from which it appears that the enemy still menaces the shores of the Rappahannock, and keeps the inhabitants in constant alarm. What his ulterior views are, cannot be penetrated; but the militia of the adjoining counties are watching his movements and prepared to oppose any attempt at landing. The dread of our riflemen, and of the desertion of his men, operates powerfully to confine him on board his ships, except when "obliged by hunger"—we cannot add, "and request of friends," for he has none, or very, very few, in Virginia. LAKE ONTARIO.
The British Squadron, under Sir James Lucas Yeo, is still at Kingston, and not expected to come out until it shall have received considerable augmentation—Commodore Chancery has now the uncontrolled command of Ontario. We hope our military commanders will not let this opportunity slip, without some vigorous effort to profit by its advantages.

THE CHESAPEAKE.
We have nothing interesting from the enemy in the Chesapeake Bay: He seems rather disposed to rest from his labors, than to be actually hostile; and is now taking his ease on Kent Island, or floating about the Bay.

A gentleman writes from Norfolk, "The only ship of the line (the Plantagenet) that was within our waters is gone to sea."

[The number of men under command of Major Croghan, by whom the enemy were so gallantly repulsed, is not mentioned in his official account, but by a letter from Governor Huntington to the Postmaster General, we learn it was only 160 men.]
