LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

New-York, Oct. 2.

The fast sailing ship Miba, Captain Glover, arrived at Boston on Saturday last, in 32 days from Liverpool...

The Editors of the Mercantile Advertiser have received from their attentive Boston correspondent, the following extracts from London papers...

At London, it is mentioned that a new ministry was about forming in France.

Lord Cochran had been tried for breaking out of prison, found guilty, and recommended to mercy. He was to be granted a pardon.

Accounts from Algiers were to July 29th, by a Sardinian vessel which had arrived at Geneva. The Captain reported that the place was fortifying...

In England, retrenchment was the order of the day.

The Manchester manufacturers were said to have found employment.

A severe shock of an earthquake was felt in Scotland on the night of Aug. 13; many chimney tops were thrown down...

At Nancy, in France, a serious affair has taken place. An officer of the war department organized a conspiracy to take possession of the tower and several persons of the Royal Family.

The Paris papers mention that the emperor of Russia is about to interfere in the internal affairs of Wittenberg...

LONDON, AUG. 12.

A letter from Paris, dated 21st inst. says, "Mr. Wilson, Consul of the U. States at Nantz, had several warm discussions with the Commissary who endeavored to subject the American merchant Captains to minute vexatious formalities..."

PARIS, AUG. 14.

Yesterday Madame Galatin, the lady of the Ambassador of the U. States, was presented to his majesty by the Marchioness de Villette...

AUG. 15.

The English expedition against Algiers, is expected at Genoa, where it will be reinforced by 2500 men.

NAPLES, AUG. 3.

We have the American men of war in our harbor; on board of one, is the minister of the United States, who is destined for Constantinople.

The following is copied from the second edition of the Boston Intelligencer of Saturday evening.

We have perused the London papers to the 24th of Aug. inclusive (received by the Miffo). They are barren of news.

There are various reports of disturbances at Nantz, Strasburg, &c.; and of an affair at Mentz, between some Russian and Prussian troops.

The French King was forming a new ministry.

The London Gazette of the 15th, contains an Order in Council, prohi-

biting the export of gunpowder, salt petre, arms and ammunition, for six months from the 15th of August.

The brig Abeono, Moison, from Hamburg for this port, is totally lost on the White Sands, between the Elbe and Weser.

The American schr. Mammoth, with a crew of upwards of 30 men, sailed the latter part of May from Buenos Ayres under the Patriot Flag...

CHIFFA VERDIA, AUG. 4.

Accounts are received of the American squadron being before Algiers, and having demanded satisfaction from the Dey for having violated the treaty; the latter is said to have sent one of his nephews on board the Commodore...

The Porte will not, it is said, make any effort to support the Barbary powers.

LATEST FROM AFRICA.

By Capt. Devons, of the Schooner Hiram, arrived at Newport, from Sierra Leone, we learn, that a French squadron consisting of several frigates, transports, &c. arrived at Goree on the 7th of July...

Sr James Yeo, in the Inconstant, frigate, was at Sierra Leone when Capt. D. sailed—He was bound down the coast after the Spanish and Portuguese slave vessels...

The war between the Negroes on the sea coast, and those of the interior still continued when Capt. Devons sailed.—Mercury.

FROM RIO DE LA PLATA.

We have received, by the schooner Maip, some papers, (Prensa Argantina) dated the 2d, 10th, and 23d of July.

In the first paper is a letter written by a respectable officer in the army of Buenos Ayres in Upper Peru, in which it is related, that the enemy's army had retreated from Tarija...

In the papers of the 15th, it is said that Gen. Artigas, upon hearing that the Portuguese intended to attack the Oriental Banda, (eastern district) marched at the head of 8,000 men...

In that of the 25d, there are some strictures favorable to Gen. Artigas, whose name, it appears, had been inserted in the army register of Spain as a Brigadier-General in the service of Ferdinand!

By the passengers in the Mary we learn that the independence of the United Provinces of Rio de la Plata had been celebrated in Buenos Ayres in the latter end of June...

We have not been enabled to learn any particulars of the new constitution.—Coh.

New-Orleans, Aug. 28.

A report was spreading for about a week, that the schooner Swift, bound from this port to Nassau, (New Providence) had been taken by the Mex-

ican squadron under Commodore Alvarez, now confined in the Gulf of Mexico... A Mexican vessel, which had already left the port of destination without having even been boarded by a Mexican vessel...

CONNECTICUT.

Hartford, Sept. 24.

The result of the semi-annual election, which was held throughout the state last week, places the republican party on a new, and as we trust a permanent ground. It has evinced what we are capable of performing...

We have not received returns from all the towns, but from those heard from, we believe we can safely say that at least NINETEEN republicans are chosen to the legislature...

Of the result of the nomination for councillors, we are unable to state precisely—it is expected, however, that two or three of the gentlemen in our ticket...

We have as yet so few returns of votes for Members of Congress, that we can hardly form an opinion. We believe, however, that not more than one, if any, of the present members are re-elected.

The termination of the election in this town was, as we have all along anticipated. We were surprised only, that the federal majority was so small. In a place, where more than one hundred federal gentlemen hold offices under the state & city...

It appears probable, from the returns received, that there will, in the next Assembly, be at least twenty republican members. It is estimated that at the late election, about 20 changes have taken place favorable to Republicanism...
