drained to the bottom, before five thousand tons would pass, if practicable.

According to the computation of Mr. Randel all the streams which are applicable to the supply of the canal discharge seven millions, four hundred and eleven thousand cubic feet per day at the places where the water may be used; but the quantity of water which will te requisite for the tanal, if twenty eight locksinl are us d daily, has been stated to be four hundred and six thousand nine hundred and twelve cubic feet, with locks of five feet rise, which is less than one eighteenth part of the water flowing daily in the streams.

FOREIGN NEWS. VERY LATE FROM EUROPE.

THE R. D. MARLING MALINE LAND

New-York, May 7. Among the numerous arrivals at this cort last evening, was the fast sailing ship Fann , Caut. Forman, in the almost unprecedented passage of twenty-one days from Greenock, whence she sailed on the 14th of April, and from the land on the 18th.

By this arrival the Editors of the Mercantile Advertiser have received London papers to the twelfth of April, (a fortight the latest) and the Clyde Shipping lists of 11th, from which we have selected the following articles, comprising every thing of interest they 'contain, either political or commercial.

The Greenock letters of the 14th of April, state the price of Flour at that place at 72s. to 74s. per barrel ; upland cotton 1s. 8d. to 10d; New-Orleans 1s. 11d. to 2s; Sea-Island 2s. 2d. to 2s. 6d.

A Treasury warrant has, we understand, been issued to persons helding official situations under government, of a thousand a year and apwards, recommending to them to relinquish or to subscribe a tenth of their salaries for the use Sof the State, in consideration of the pub-Tic distresses; and holding forth the example of the Lords of the Treasury themselves, who, it appears, have thus give. up for the present, or for a limited time. a tenth of the stipend attached to their situations.

GREENOCK, APRIL 4.

The riots at Manchester have been completely suppressed, and the fears of its inhabitants allayed, by the prompt assemblage of the military who now invest that town. Several persons, who had been found most active in promoting disorder, were apprehended and sent to London. A disturbance also appears to have taken place at Carlisle, which savored more of robbery, than having for its object any political purpose.

The assent was on Monday given by Commission, to the Seditious Meetings Bill, and an adjournment of both Houses took place ; the Lords for Wednesday fortnight, and Commons for Monday the 14th instant.

From the London Courier, April 7.

Our Paris letter to-day, is of more importance than it appears to be. The Liberal party, as they call themselves, have long been making efforts to deprive the King of his body guards, because they are sincerely Royalists; and stratagems have been forming to entrap them in quarrels, to render them odious, and produce their dismissal. In this it seems the Liberales are succeeding. Many of the officers of the corps threaten to resign. Marshal Macdonald has just assumed the command of them, after having delayed doing so, under the pretence of illness, tho in reality, it is supposed, till some appointments were made suited to his wirlies .-Our private letters represent this afflir as likely to lead to very important consequences. It is said to be in contemplation to dissolve the body guard.

LATE FROM PERNAMBUCO.

The brig Gen. Ward, which arrived at Nev York on the 5th inst. sailed from Pernambuce on the 26th of March. Mr. Sacket, a passenger, informs us that nothing new had occurred at that place since the date of our former accounts .-The place remained quiet. The government were providing gun boats, putting the forts in order, and making every preparation for defence, against an attack which was expected would soon take place from the Portuguese ships of war.

Translated for the Mercantile Advertiser from the Portuguese.

It being deemed expedient, according to the dictates of prudence, more particularly in the present state of affairs, not to permit indiscriminately the departure of vessels and the extraction of funds, by which the public cause might be weakened; and it being likewise very necessary strenuously to protect the persons and property of the citizens belonging to this state, which may be found within the territory of the Court of Rio de Janeiro, against the measures she may take agams them, the Commonwealth decrees as follows:

1st. No person residing within thi Commonwealth shall be permitted to leave it without a passport granted by the Executive, who may grant or refuse the permission.

2d. The pass is to be requested through the Secretary of the government, and, it being acceded to, it is to be despatched, observing the legal formalities.

3d. All the property of persons absenting themselves without permission, shall be confiscated, and delivered in due form into the hands of the person appointed for that purpose by the Executive.

4th. The produce of said property, whilst confiscated, if they should yield within a year, shall be applied to the government, together with a commission for the same, as in any other of the rents belongin to it.

5th. The citizens whom the government shall entries with the arrangement of the same, shall fulfil their instructions with the most strict attention.

Portneuese subjects, which may be found within the territory of this Commonwealth, shall be confiscated, in order to warrant that of our cuizens, which may be confiscated by the Portuguese government.

7ch.
