

number then. I would ask, the massacre of which would constitute an act of war? Sir, my own humble impressions upon this subject are, that the wanton massacre of an infant not yet able to lift the enviable declaration of "I am an American Citizen," should be as promptly avenged, as if fifty, or fifty thousand citizens had been thus massacred. When reparation is refused by the Nation (whether red or white, civilized or savage) to whom the offenders belong—the nation itself becomes accountable, and should be chastised for the outrage.

I have little confidence in the expectation of obtaining any considerable aid from the friendly Indians; even should they join me, the loss of their Chiefs may induce them to follow the example of the Warriors under Perryman, and go over to the enemy; and I owe it to myself and to the public service to apprise you of the existence of a spirit of opposition, tending to counteract my efforts, having recently manifested itself in what is deemed to be the friendly part of the Creek Nation; originating, as I have reason to believe, with some evil disposed white persons, actually engaged in smuggling Negroes into the United States from East Florida. A considerable number, as I am credibly informed and believe, have been taken to the immediate vicinity of the Creek Agency. It rests with the Agent to detect or explain this apparent violation of law. The movement of the troops and the active and general hostility of the Indians near the Florida line, will have a strong tendency to render this abominable traffic difficult and perilous; hence I expect to be honored with the ill-will of every one engaged in it.

WAR DEPARTMENT.
Section of Bounty Lands.

ALL persons interested in obtaining WARRANTS for Military Bounty Land due to the Soldiers of the late Army of the United States, are requested to take particular notice of the above CAPTION or TITLE, in order to distinguish between the information that issues from THIS OFFICE, and the instructions given by the Commissioner of the GENERAL LAND OFFICE, attached to the TREASURY DEPARTMENT, from whence the PATENTS or DEFINITIVE TITLES to the land here spoken of, as well as of all other lands sold and ceded by the United States, must issue.

The present notice appears to be necessary from the errors that have frequently occurred of late in the proceedings of persons who have lost, or pretended to have lost an "HONORABLE DISCHARGE," or the evidence of a MILITARY LAND WARRANT, which has been issued upon such a discharge.

A special law was made by Congress for the relief of persons who have bona fide sustained such loss as was contemplated by this law. The Executive rules and regulations applicable to it, were only promulgated so long ago as July, 1812; of course, according to the general tenor of all laws of that class, that is, the execution of which is directed to be according to such rules and regulations as the President of the United States shall prescribe—these rules became a part of the law, and are only to be abrogated, or altered, by the same line of authority through which they were first established; excepting indeed, the SOVEREIGN authority should interfere.

In several instances recently presented at this office, individuals who, probably, may be entitled to the benefit of the law above cited, have erroneously confounded their proceedings with those directed by a late regulation, proceeding from the General Land Office, where blank declarations, ready to be filled up, have been distributed throughout the United States, for other laudable purposes; but which are not calculated to serve in a compliance with the law relative to Lost Warrants and Discharges; in the execution of which it is not intended that any innovation shall be sanctioned.

For the information of all persons interested in such cases, it is thought proper to re-issure the following correct copy of the Rules and Regulations in question, from which no deviation can be permitted.
Rules & Regulations to govern in applications at the Section of Bounty Lands, War Department, in cases of lost Warrants and lost discharges.
War Department.

The act of Congress of the 26th of April 1816, having provided that, where any MILITARY LAND WARRANTS shall be lost or destroyed, upon due proof thereof, to the satisfaction of the Secretary of War, a Patent shall issue in the same manner as if the Warrant was produced; and, when the same proof shall be produced, that any Soldier of the regular Army has lost his Discharge and Certificate of faithful service, the Secretary of War shall cause papers to be furnished such soldier as will entitle him to his Land Warrant and Patent: To enable all persons, comprehended by the provisions of the said act, to avail themselves of the relief intended to be granted, the Secretary of the Department of War has directed that in case of Military Land Warrants, which have been lost or destroyed, the party shall, upon oath in writing, state the time, place, and manner of such loss or destruction, the date and number of the warrant, and the company and regiment to which the soldier belonged at the time of his discharge; and also the state, county and township, in which he resides. The oath must be made before an officer duly qualified to administer it, and the official character and signature of such officer must be certified by the clerk of the county, the mayor of the city, or by such other officer as is required by the laws and usages of the state where it is made. Every application will be advertised one month in the papers of the state where the applicant resides, before any decision will be made in the case by the Secretary of the Department. Evidence in corroboration of that of the party, will be required, where it is not satisfactorily shown to be out of his power to produce it.
In the case of lost DISCHARGES, the deposition, in addition to the time, place, and manner, of the loss or destruction of the DISCHARGE, must set forth the time and place of enlistment, the company and regiment to which the soldier belonged at the time of his discharge, the date of the discharge, and rank and name of the officer who signed it—it must also state whether the Discharge contained the certificate of faithful service required by law, or the words "HONORABLY DISCHARGED," or words of that import. The deposition of a disinterested witness, as to the service and discharge of the applicant, is required in corroboration of his own testimony. Where this is not produced, the reason of its non-production must be satisfactorily stated. The testimony must be authenticated in the manner [above] prescribed in the case of lost Warrants. Where the precise date or numbers cannot be stated, they may be stated to the best of the recollection of the witnesses, whose credibility the certificate who takes the evidence in conformity with the usual form.

RALEIGH.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 1818.

The Council of State, this evening met in this city on a regular session for the purpose of advising with the Governor on the question of appointing a Judge of the Superior Court, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Judge Lowrey; but owing to the deep snow which fell in the morning of the country on Friday night, and Saturday last, a quorum of the Council did not arrive here till Tuesday morning. On Wednesday morning five Members present, viz. Messrs Franklin, Gideon Alston, William M. Pugh, Wm. Blackledge and J. G. Gillespie, Esqrs. met, and being duly organized, received a communication from the Governor, mentioning the constitutional difficulty which had been suggested, but giving his opinion in favor of acting efficiently in the case; stating, that though the late Judge died the day before the Legislature rose, yet his death could not have been known to that body. The Council unanimously concurring with his Excellency in opinion, proceeded to the appointment; when BARRISTER YANNEY, Esq. of Caswell County (late Speaker of the Senate) was chosen to fill the vacancy, and the Council adjourned that evening.

The new Brick Church, in this city, which is now finished, will be opened by Divine Service, and an administration of the Lord's Supper, on Sunday next.—It is believed that the Pews will be disposed of at an early day.

Stage-Coaches.—Mr. Ashmun submitted for consideration to the Senate of the U. States, a bill, which has been since agreed to, the following Resolution:
Resolved, That the Committee on the Judiciary be instructed to enquire into the expediency of providing for the security of passengers in Stage-Coaches, in which the mail of the U. States may be transported, against dangers arising from gross negligence of proprietors and drivers.

Albion K. Parris, a Representative in Congress from Massachusetts, has been appointed by the President and Senate, to be District Judge of the U. States for the district of Maine, in the place of Judge Sewall, resigned.

The state of Georgia seems determined to put down Negro Speculation. Six citizens of Putnam County have announced their determination, if the public officers should fail in their duty, to enforce the law of last session, to this good work, they earnestly invite the co-operation of the citizens of the other counties, which it is hoped they will receive as they merit.

The British Consul at New-York, having, by public advertisement, invited the loyal subjects of his Sovereign to call at his office and sign an Address of Condolence to the Prince Regent on the death of his daughter, a number of them did so. Others, however, who ascertained that the Address was more of a political eulogium on the Prince Regent, the British Constitution and Empire, than a paper of real condolence, assembled in public meeting, and entered their Protest against it. The Protest is full of reprobation of the personal character of the Prince and of the conduct of his Ministers.

The fate of the unfortunate MINA, the South-American Patriot General, is confirmed by the Mexican Gazette Extraordinary, in which the death of Moreno, Bergara, and a number of their men, is also stated.
