THE BRITISH MEDIATION.

FROM THE NATIONAL ADVOCATE.

The basis of the negotiation for Great Britain, to mediate with Spain and her colonies, has been definitively settled by the five great continental powers...

The conditions which are to be prescribed to the colonies for acknowledging the supremacy of Spain, are said to be as follows:

1st. The establishment of provincial assemblies.

2d. A large proportion of natives to fill offices.

3d. All taxes to originate with the colonies.

4th. A free trade with all the world.

5th. Cultivation, export and import, to be regulated by the people of the colonies in their assemblies.

If these are the conditions which five great powers have decided upon, it must be evident that the hopes of Ferdinand the 7th rest on a very slender basis, and that South-America approximates towards independence with a rapidity that Europe cannot check or prevent...

Great Britain will tranquilly urge these conditions, because they appear to benefit the Patriots while they actually favor European control, and at the same time commerce can be the more readily monopolized.
