RUSSIAN VOYAGE OF DISCO-VERY.

St. Petershurgh, Oct. 31.

The following is an abstract of the

report of Lieur. Katzbue to the Chancellor Count Romanzow :

In consequence of instructions given to Lient. Kotzine he was to sail in the summer of 1817, to Northern Boy, to make a veyage into the interior of North-Ameri-Lea. \*Combromably to those instructions, Lieut, K. sailed on the 17th of July, 1817, from the Port of St. Peter and St. P ul for the above named bay. The wind was so favorable on the passage that on the 26th, he arrived t the Isle of St. Lawreace, about two degrees south of Behring's Straits. THE BRITISH MEDIATION.

PROM THE NATIONAL ADVOCATE.

The basis of the negociation for Great Britain, to mediate with Spain and her colonies, has been definitively settled by the five great continental powers, though it is evident that the protocol was prepared by the cabinet of St. James, if we are to be governed by its features.

The conditions which are to be prescribed to the colonies for acknowledging the supremacy of Spain, are said to be as fo lows:

1st. The establishment of provincial as-2d A large proportion of natives to fill of-

3d. All taxes to originate with the colonies.

. 4th A free trade with all the world. 5th Cultivation, export and import, to be

rigulated by he people of the colonies in their assemblies.

If these are the conditions which five great powers have decided upon, it must be evident that the hopes of Ferdinand the 7th rest on a very slen- Tennessee. It is supposed he will attempt der basis, and that South-America approximates towards independence with a rapidity that Europe cannot check or prevent, for such conditions, am nating virtually to independence. would never be offered to weak and mefficient powers. It is not to be denied that such are the conditions which Great Butain would propose in a mediation, for while the hopes of legitmacy would be maintained-while the shadow of royalty would be supported, and the new republics would receive a shock, trade, the grand desideratum, would be lef free for commercial monopolies or commercial influence and a check still held on the provinces, to prevent any opposition to European confederacies. Such conditions would only be offered a people who ha! the means of freedom within their grasp, and of whose eventual independence no doubt could be entertained. If the Patriots of South-America can be seduced by such rempting offers, then they are incapasle of estimating the value of the liberty for which they are contending. The struggle is not for provincial governents, internal taxation, and a free rade: it is for substantial indepenience-it is to be released from the oke of monarchy-of European conaul; to be, in short, free and soveman, not in part, but in the whole, to are their independence acknowledged, and their gevernments accredital. If the Patriots accept these consitions, and put up their swords, acknowledge the jurisdiction of Ferdinand, with his character and his views, they will enjoy them no longer than he can tread out the last spark of it-

Independence. Great Britain will tranquilly urge these conditions, because they appear to benefit the Patriots while they actually favor European controll, and at the same time commerce can be the more readily monopolized. Should ly of wa they, however, be refused, the British cabinet will take no measures to enforce them, as their object is to make money out of mediation or independence, and this independence they will be the first to acknowledge for in eiest, or attempt to destroy from the same motives.

WAR DEPARTMENT, Pen ion Office, Dec. 23. THE following evidence will be required in all Militia cases, & in cases of the Regular Army, where the Discharge and Surgeon's Certificate have been lost or destroyed, or where they have never been originally granted, to enable the Secretary of War to grant Pensions, viz :

In cases where the regular discharge and the surgeon's certificate for disability, cannot be had, the applicant for a pension, whether he has been a soldier of the regular army or a militiaman in the service of the United States, must produce the sworn certificate of his Captain, or other officer under whom he served, stating distinctly the time & place or his having been wounded, or otherwise disabled, and that the same wounds or disabilities a ose while in the service of the United States, and in the line of his duty, with the affidavit of one or more surgeons or physicians, whether of the army or citizens, accuof making it his permanent residence, trately describing the wound, and stating the de ree of disability to which the soldier may own and its Vicinity, that he has formed all be entitled under it : these documents to be sworn to before a Judge of the United States Court, or some State Judge or Justice of the Peace; and if a State Judge or Just ce of the Prace, then under the seal of the ! lerk of the C up v in which such Judge or Justice may reside, and in the name of the paymaster who last paid the soldier as belonging to the service f the United States, to be in ev ry astance furnished by the applicant, in order o determine the d te of the commencement of his pension
