Charleston, June 26. We learn by Capt. Ames, who arrived this morning in two days from St. Augustine, that great preparations in mounting cannon, &cc. were making in that place in consequence of an expected attack from the American army under General Jackson. He further states, that when he left St. Augustine, it was reported that the American army was rapidly advancing towards that place

From the Nashwille Clarion, June 16.

A gentleman immediately from the army, states that Gen. Jackson having obtained full proof that the Spanish autiorities at Pensacola had been active in fo menting the Seminole war, had issued ammunition and rations to the hostile Indiens, and had made that post a kind of rallying point for them, whilst vessels bearing the American flax, leaded with provisions for his suffering troops, were forbid to pass up the Escambia, he determined to prevent the renewal of the scenes of carnage and savage barbarity beretofore witnessed on the frontier (which were to be expected as seen as the army was disbanded) by first removing the Spaniards from the country. With a part of the army he proceeded to effect this object ; he was fired on by the garrison, and two of his men killed; he immediately invested the fort, which after a tremendous cannonade surrendered. The General obtained an immense number of field pieces, small arms and ammunition; he garrison d the fort, and sent the Spanish Governor &c. to Cuba

The arrival of the American tr ops at Pensacola was hailed with joy by the inhabitants; real property rose in three days 300 per cent.

The time con umed in repairing the works at Pensacola-arranging the government, &c. will delay the return of our fellow-citizens to their homes a few days. Gen. Jackson is with the volunteers, and will be in Columbia about the 25th instant, where he means to discharge and pay them off. On the 3rd instant he was at Fort Montgomery.

OLD SOLDIERS.

For the information of these citizens of North-Carolina who are desirous of obtaining the benefit of the late Act of Congress, entitled " An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War," the following explanations of the Act and of the practice under it are deemed expedient :

Judging from the applications already made, however explicit the Act may be, it seems to be necessary to inform the applicears that the service must appear to have been on the Continental establishmental all the end of the war, or for a teru of like months, at least, of continued service and not by adding together fracervice performed at different persons to make up the term of nine -that nothing but actual service is the rewarded-that the substitute, and northe constituent, is emitted to the pen cion. Whether therefore a man enlisted. or entered as a volunteer, or as a draft, or was hired to clear a class, or become a substitute for another, he alone is entitled to the reward.

The declarations of applicants may be m de, both before the District Judge of the U. States or any Judge of the State

Courts, and before any Court of record .-Were the parties then to avail themselves of the privilege of applying to their respective County Courts, they would in many instances not only save the fatigue and expence of travelling a considerable distance to a Judge, but would avoid the inconvenience (and consequent delay) of procusing afterwards, in their own neighborhood, the requisite additional evidence, and of transmitting it to the Judge.

If the declaration is made before a Judge, he is to certify and transmit the testimony and proceedings to the Secretary of War; but if it be made before a Court, the act of Congress is silent as to the person who shall thus certify & transsuch case to be, for all the proceedings to be had before the Court, & for the Chairman, as presiding Migistrate, and by the mit them, under the seal of the Court,
