Our Academy .- The semi annual Examination of this Institution took place this week. The progress of the Students, in both the Maie and Female Departments, was, in gene al. such as met the approbation of the Trustees A detailed Report of the Examination will be read at the State-House to-day. and an Address be made to the Students, in behalf of the Trustees, by Dr. Burgess. Four of the young Ladies, viz. Misses Flinn, Robertson, Du Bose and Watkins --- the two former from South-Carolina, the two latter from Georgia, will receive the honors of the Institution -- Gold Medals and Honorary Certificates from the Trustees.

The Cape-Fear Recorder is relinquished by Mr. T. Loring in favor of Mr. Wm Holinshead, Mr. Loring advertises his intention of publishing a paper at the new town of Blakely, in Montgomery County.

South-Carolina .-- Messrs Lowntles, Simkins, Irvin and Overstreet are elecited to Congress.

Navigation of the Schuylkill .- We learn, from a late Philadelphia paper, that by a late improvement at a place cailed Flat Rock in that River, by means of a Crib Dam, the result of immense labor, the greatest difficulty in the navigation of that River has been overcome. The Dain is 600 feet in length, 13 or 14 feet high. A Canal of sufficient width and depth is made of two miles down the east side of the stream; so that instead of a shoal, rocky, and of course perilous navigation, there is a safe and easy surface of a canal, which promises a great increase of trade to Philadelphia.

An estimate has been made, that the lands lately ceded by the Indians it the state of Indiana, amount to about March; seven millions of acres.

Agricultural Society of Virginia .-The Society met at the Union Hotel in Richmond on the 19th ult. last, Wilson C. Nicholas, Esq. its Vice-President, took the chair. Various regulations for the good government of the Society were proposed and adopted. Several interesting papers were read, the Society dined together, and after an amicable and agreeable day, separated --- to meet again on the 8th of i)ecember.

The Russian Bible Society .- Fostered by the paternal care of his imperial majesty Alexander, the Russian Bible Society has, in the course of the past year, enlarged very considerably the Sold of its exertions, and strengthened itself by various newly formed and promising auxiliaries, in different parts of the Empire. The following are the principal stations which they respectively occupy :-- Penza, Kostroma, Tobolsk, Kief, Orel, Vladimer, Irkutsk, Kazan, Simbirsk. Pskoff, Minsk, Bialastock, Grodno, Posen, Bessarabia, Tahanrog, Tscherkask, and Twer. Of all the auxiliary Societies, that at Moscow is (as from the rank of this ancient capital might be expected) the most splendid and efficient; and, as well in the zeal of its supporters as in the scale of its operations. is inferior only to the parent Society at St Petersburg.

"I consider" (said the Emperor, in is address to the Moscow Bible Socie-(n) "the establishment of Bible Socie ties in Russia, in most parts of Europe. and in other quarters of the globe, and the very great progress these institutions have made in disseminating the word of God, not merely among christians, but alas! among Heathens and Mahomedans, as a peculiar display of the mercy and grace of God to the human race. On this account, I have taken upon myself the denomination of a member of the Russian Bible Society, and will render it every possible assistance, in order that the beneficent light of revelation may be sited among all nations subject to my sceptre."

The widows and minor children of soldiers that died in the service of the U. States, during the late war, are informed, the law giving them commutation, or five years' half pay pension, in lieu of land, expires on the 15th day of February next. (1819.) Those persons that are entitled to the pension, amounting to 240 dollars, that do not apply for it before that period, will probably be forever after debarred from obtaining it. This notice, which is given by an agent in one of the northern states, in the shape of an advertisement to claimants, inviting their application to him, we publish gratuitously; reminding them, at the same time, that no agency is necessary in the case. Claimants who are ignorant of the mode of transacting the business, may avail themselves of the aid of the Representatives of their respec tive districts, in Congress, who will take pleasure in affording it, at the approaching session, to make the necessary application, &c at the public offices.

It is said that the exports from N Orleans, for the present year, will amount to twenty millions of dollars. Those of Savannah, for the year ending on the first instant, amounted to upwards of fourteen millions of dollars.

The convention of the state of Illinois, in forming their constitution, have declared that " No person shall be im-· prisoned for debt, unless upon refusal to deliver up his estate for the benefit of his creditors, in such manner as 'shall be prescribed by law, or in cases where there is strong presumption 'el fraud." Thus the youngest sister of the family has attempted what others have recoiled from, in respect to the relations of debtor and creditor, as the next voungest (Mississippi) has done in regard to usury. If these experiments succeed, it is to be hoped will not be too proud to follow the examples thus set.

Rhede-Island, it appears, is now the only State in the Union without a written Constitution; and the old charter of Charles II being acknowledged to be defective, it is presumed that State will not long remain without a Constitution.

close their ears to the cries of Humanity, of Justice, which have so long a seeded in reprobation of our Criminal Law-they will at length free our State from the stigma of cruetty, and their own souls from the sin At abetting, may authorising murder; for only in this dreadful light can I view the law which deprives a man of life for stealing. It is inconsistent with justice to make murder and theft equal in the eye of the law; it is contrary to the dictates of reason and to the law of Godfor surely that holy & merciful law which provided cities of refuge even for murdererers when the crime was not premeditated, can never sanction one which hur. an immortal being to his long account; which tears a shrinking wreich from friends, from life, for depriring another of that, the less of which, though it be the owner's all, will be forgotten or repaired long ere the parent's heart has cented to throb with auguish, or the brother's cheek to burn with sname at the recollection of the cruel and ignominious death of the hapless criminal. Nay, the very purpose for which the law was originally enacted is defeated by this monstrous inequality between crimes and punishment: for, instead of preventing crimes, it is calculated to increase their number, or at least their attocky-knowing that his life is forfixed by the commission of a theft under certain circumstances, the man, whose heart would otherwise have shudderingly recoiled from imbruing his hands in the blood of a fellow-creature, might in case of detection be urged by desperation to commit murder. Or hear the words of Beccaria which go still further: "If anequal punishment be ordained for two crimes which injure society in different degrees, there is nothing to deter men from committing the greater, as often as it is attended with greater advantage."-C. 4, p. 29. Again-" There ought to be a fixed proportion between crimes and punishments."-C. 4, h. 26.

Legislators! Guardians and enactors of the laws! Erect a PENITENTIARY, and you place a formidable bar between the greater and the lesser crimes-even death itself-for when this punishment is restricted to crimes of the first magnitude, criminals will no longer hope for pardon. from the Chief Magistrate. And says the author above quoted "Crimes are more effectually prevented by the certainty, than by the severity of punishments."-By enacting laws so severe as to call imperiously for clemency from the Governor, you do an injury to society, and virtually increase the number of crimes.

To attribute all attachment to principles, and even modes of worship, to illiberality of mind, is itself illiberal. If an attachment, whether it be to one or the other, be the effect of impartial research; and a firm persuasion that they are the mend of God as revealed in his word, it is so far from indicating a bigotted, contracted, or illiberal mind, that it may ariso from the centrary. The more we under stand of divine truth, the more our minds will be entarged, and the more decided will be our opposition to error. To call that liberality which holds all doctrines with a loose hand, and considers it as of no importance to salvation, whether we believe this or that, is a gross perversion of language. Such a spirit arises, not from an enlargedness of mind, or from having read much, or thought much; but from the vanity of wishing to have it thought that they have. This vanity induces its possessor to assume important airs and to exercise a kind of contemptuous pity towards these who cannot treat the Gospet

with the same indifference as themselves. It seems a criterion of this species of liberality that we think well of characters, whatever be their principles, & entertain the most favorable opinion of their final state. Such sentiments may doubtless be denominated liberal, that is, free and enlarged, in one sense ;-they are free from the restraints of Scripture, and enlarged as a net which contains a great multitude of fishes, good and bad; but whether this that the matrons of the confederation | eight to recommend them, is another
