The French kept a vessel upon this lake before the war of 1756, and it is hoped that the American government, in its negotiations with the British have not compounded the right of doing the same thing.

RALEIGH:
FRIDAY, MARCH 19, 1819.
The brig Kaleidoscope, Swain, of Wilmington, on her voyage to Bermuda, was unfortunately wrecked on the 4th ult, in lat. 34, 01, N. long. 73. W. The Captain and crew had arrived, on the 4th inst. at Savannah, in the schr. Catherine, Capt. Webb.

The Legislature of Virginia adjourned on the 15th instant, after a session of ninety-eight days, during which they passed 280 acts.

It is understood (says the last Savannah Republican) that the President of the United States will visit our city in the course of the next month; and it is highly gratifying to state, that preparations are already commenced to give him a splendid and hearty repose.

At a meeting of the Directors of the Bank of the United States, held at their Banking House, in Philadelphia, on the 6th instant, Langdon Cheves, Esq. was unanimously elected President.

Supreme Court.—Mr. Justice Johnson, on the 12th inst delivered the opinion of the Court in the case of certain Goods taken out of the Spanish ship *Caradad*, affirming the decree of the Inferior Court, restoring the goods to the possession of the Carthaginian captors, upon the ground that the privateer, by whom they were originally captured, was cruising under a commission from the Republic or Province of Cartagena, and was not fitted out in this country, nor had committed any other violation of the strict and impartial neutrality which is maintained by the United States, in the present war between Spain and her revolted Colonies.

The time having arrived when it is necessary for the Judges to go on the Spring Circuits, the court adjourned sine die, after hearing and deciding a greater number of important causes than have ever been determined at any former term.

Miscell.—The crimes (says the last Halifax Compiler) which this man is said to be guilty of, seem to have created a general desire in the public to know his fate; which as far as we have learned, for public satisfaction we will briefly state. The public already have a knowledge of the crimes with which this man stood charged; one is for horse stealing, and the other was for bigamy; the first he now stands charged with; and waits in confinement the sitting of our next Superior Court, when justice to him will be awarded.—On the latter charge, he has been arraigned before his Honor Judge Daniel, the presiding at the last term of the Superior Court in Pitt county, where the offence was committed, and was released by a Jury of forty-odd men. We learn that the evidence adduced against him, bore every mark of his guilt; but the all important and only necessary thing, to have lawfully confirmed his guilt and consigned him to an ignominious death, could not be produced. This great impediment to the prosecution, combined with the overpowering eloquence of his counsel, (William Gaston) rendered every argument the attorney for the commonwealth produced, void and of no avail.
Union of Halifax.—It is with congratulation to the well-wishers of our venerable little town, that we hail its prosperity; venerable for its age and respectability; for its being the seat of revolutionary struggles, and once the Metropolis of the State. With reverence and awe do we often cast a wistful eye on the decayed and falling fabrics which surrounded us; deserted and lonely as they are, they bespeak their fallen greatness. Since that period, until a year or two back, it seems to have been under a decline, when the era of Internal Improvement shewed, that Halifax might be made to vie with any of its sister towns. Already is the work begun; last week our street presented a pleasing aspect to the citizens; as usual, it was thronged with strangers, waggons, carts and horses; when to cap the climax, was beheld with very agreeable sensations, a long row of hog-heads of Tobacco, finding their way to our ware-houses; hitherto occupied only by a few casks of lime, but now groaning under many a thousand weight of Tobacco.—*Compiler.*

COMMUNICATIONS.
U. States Bank.—The stock of this Bank is again looking up; having passed the ordeal, no fears are now felt of its future prosperity—\$125 per share, was offered in this city, for 50 shares a few days past, and refused sales.

Mr. Lowdes, the distinguished Representative in Congress, from South Carolina, sailed from New-York on the 10th instant, for Liverpool, in the Ship Albion. It is his intention to make a short tour of observation in Europe, and return before the next Session of Congress.

Ninian Edwards has been re-elected Senator to Congress from the state of Illinois, for six years from the 4th of March next, at which time his present term of service will expire.

J. C. Spencer, who received a plurality of votes at the late trial, in the Legislature of New-York, to elect a Senator in Congress, to succeed Mr. King, has publicly declined being considered a candidate for that office.

George Clark, the late commander of the piratical ship *Louisa*, destroyed off Charleston, was arrested on the 4th instant; and, after a full examination committed to the jail of that place, for trial. This is the same fellow who plundered Captain Finley, of the ship *Boston*, at the Isle of May.

In the District Court of the U. S. now in session in this city, it was yesterday adjudged, that the Portuguese ship *Monte Allegro*, and cargo, captured by the Patriot privateer *El Patriota*, and sent into this port, should be restored to the owners.—*Balt. Gaz.*

On the 15th day of Feb. 1819, in Hagerstown, Washington county, state of Maryland, a certain free white man named Andrew Wilson, was convicted before John Hershey, esq. of profane swearing, and not having money to pay his fines (about 7 dollars) the corporeal punishment of whipping, in conformity with the orders of Mr. Hershey, was afflicted by J. Howard, a constable.

The remains of two dead bodies, found in a fresh grave in the woods near the Six Mile House, from which the gang of robbers was lately dislodged, have been examined by the coroner of Charleston. One of the bodies appeared to have been a white man, buried in a box made of rough slabs; the other the remains of a young female negro, supposed to have been deposited in the grave upwards of two years.

The amount of claims for Spanish spoliation possessed in Boston is said to exceed a million and a half dollars; the proportion of one merchant being three hundred and fifty thousand dollars, besides interest for 15 years.—We understand that merchants in this town have similar claims to a very considerable amount.—*Prov. paper.*

Fire.—Last evening (says a Philadelphia paper of March 10,) the inhabitants of this city were alarmed with the cry of fire; it proved to be the MASONIC HALL, in Chesnut street. & in two hours that noble structure, the pride and ornament of our city, was in ruins—the fire had made such progress before it was discovered, that the utmost exertions of our energetic fire companies were found inadequate to subdue the destructive element.—We learn that it originated from a beam which extended under the fire place in the Ball-room, in the lower part of the building; a cotillion party, who were to have met there, had not assembled when the fire was discovered.

Melish's Map has been referred to in the late negotiations with Spain. From that Map it appears, that the whole domain of the United States, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean, is about equal to two million two hundred and fifty six thousand, nine hundred and fifty-five square miles; of which that part lying East of the Mississippi, & including the Floridas, is equal to nine hundred and forty-two thousand, one hundred and forty square miles. If the whole domain were as populous as Connecticut at the last census, (1810) it would contain a population of one hundred and thirty five millions, four hundred and seventeen thousand three hundred persons; and if as populous as Italy now is, the number would be five hundred and one million, forty-four thousand and ten! Give but the imagination play, and there is no limit to the grandeur we may anticipate for our country. Nay, if arithmetic be true, a very few brief years will find this the most powerful nation on the globe. We have only to wish that it may be as enlightened as it will be powerful.—*Nat. Int.*

Large Oxen.—There are now exhibiting at Baltimore two oxen raised by Mr. John Barney, of Port Penn, in the state of Delaware, whose dimensions are as follows:

She was purchased by the agent of Jolie, and being fitted in a superior style, was to sail the same day with the *Jane*, to take in her armament at the Five Islands, and join the squadron there.

Thursday, the 1st day of April next, is recommended as a day of humiliation, fasting and prayer throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, by a proclamation from the Governor, dated the 20th ult.

Extract from "An excursion into the Country," taken from the Virginia Evangelical and Literary Magazine.

It is very gratifying to observe a spirit of improvement at work in the building of Churches, as well as in many other things.

This is a subject of no small importance. A house of worship pervious to every blast; that lets in the heat of summer and the cold of winter, the rain and the snow, will certainly prevent regular habits of attending divine service. And much of the moral good produced by the institutions of religion, results from the habits of sober, and orderly, and regular attendance on them. Again, houses too small for the comfortable accommodation of attendant worshippers, are sure to produce the offensive and mischievous practice so common in our country, of leaving Church before service closes; and of talking and laughing without, while the worship of God is going on within doors.

Farther, the fashion of sitting promiscuously on benches, instead of in pews, puts it utterly out of the power of parents to keep their children with them, and under their own eyes during divine service. Hence, those habits of levity and indecorum so often complained of among the young. And hence, the reproach that often falls on pious parents on account of the conduct of their children. I have seen distinguished professors of religion, weeping in one part of a church, while their daughters were giggling and whispering with young sparks in another; and their boys were playing with negroes and vicious youth out of doors. It is most clearly for the interests of morality and religion, that Churches should be fitted with pews instead of benches; and that by some arrangement, those pews should be appropriated to the families that compose the worshipping congregations.

It is easy to make comfortable provision for occasional hearers. The aspect of a congregation thus arranged, is delightful. A mother at one end of a pew, a father at the other, and the children between them, all serious, orderly and attentive, form a group in the highest degree interesting.

It seems in this case as though the intimacies and affections, and enjoyments of domestic life, were bro't to the sanctuary of Gods house, to be purified and exalted and prepared for affording still higher joys. The holiness of religion; and glories of eternity seem to invest these nearest and dearest relations of man, and clothe them with the majesty and grandeur of immortality."
