BY AUTHORITY.

An act making appropriations for the support of Government for the Year one thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby, respectively appropriated, that is to say:

For compensation granted by law to the members of the Senate and House of Representatives, their officers and attendants, three hundred and sixty thousand and ten dollars. For the expenses of fire wood, stationery, printing, and other contingent expenses, of the two Houses of Congress, forty-two thousand dollars.

April, eighteen hundred and eighteen, five thousand two hundred & fifty dollars. For additional clerk hire, being for an arrears of pay to an assistant to the chief clerk in said office, three hundred dollars. For a further allowance for clerk hire, being for the salary of said assistant, for the year eighteen hundred and nineteen, four hundred dollars.

For compensation to the clerks in the office of said commissioners, per act of twentieth April, eighteen hundred and eighteen, three thousand five hundred & fifty dollars. For an addition to the allowance for clerk hire in said office, four thousand dollars. For compensation to the messenger in said office, four hundred and ten dollars.

For compensation to the clerks in the office of said commissioners, per act of twentieth April, eighteen hundred and eighteen, twenty-two thousand seven hundred dollars. For compensation to the messengers in the General Post Office, six hundred and sixty dollars. For compensation to the Assistant Post Master General, two thousand five hundred dollars.
