BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

WHEREAS, by an act of Congress, passed on the 3d of March, 1815, entitled "An act to provide for the ascertaining and surveying of the boundary lines fixed by the treaty with the Creek Indians, and for other purposes," the President of the United States is authorized to cause the lands acquired by the said treaty to be offered for sale, when surveyed.

Therefore, I, James Monroe, President of the United States, do hereby declare & make known, that public sales for the disposal (agreeably to law) of certain lands in the territory of Alabama, shall be held at Huntsville, in said territory, as follows:

On the first Monday in July next, for the sale of townships 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14, in ranges 1 and 2, west—9, 10, 11, 12, 13 & 14, in ranges 1, east—9, 11, 12, 13 and 14, in range 1, east—9, 11, 12, 14, in range 2, east—12 and 13, in range 3, east—11, 12 and 13, in range 4, east.

Leave Salem every Tuesday at 2 p m and arrive at Union ch on Friday at 6 p m and arrive at Salem on Tuesday by 10 a m.

From Rutherfordton by Hartmonville to Macksaysville, once in two weeks 32 miles. Leave Rutherfordton every other Friday at 6 a m and arrive at Macksaysville by 3 p m.

Leave Macksaysville at 4 p m and arrive at Rutherfordton on Saturday by 2 p m.

From Statesville by Campbell's Grove to Morgantown, once a week. Leave Statesville every Wednesday at 9 a m and arrive at Morgantown on Tuesday by 11 a m.

Leave Morgantown every Monday at 6 a m and arrive at Statesville on Tuesday by 6 p m.

From Chapel Hill to Lexington, once a week. Leave Chapel Hill every Wednesday at 6 a m and arrive at Lexington on Thursday by 11 a m.

Leave Lexington every Thursday at 1 p m and arrive at Chapel Hill on Friday by 6 p m.

NOTES. 1. The Post-master General may expedite the mails and alter the times for arrival and departure at any time during the continuance of the contract, he stipulating an adequate compensation for any extra expense that may be occasioned thereby.

2. Fifteen minutes shall be allowed for opening and closing the mail at all offices where no particular time is specified.

3. For every thirty minutes delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the time prescribed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar; and if the delay continue until the departure of any depending mail, whereby the mails destined for such depending mail lose a trip, a forfeiture of double the amount allowed for carrying the mail one trip shall be incurred, unless it shall be made to appear that the delay was occasioned by unavoidable accident; in which case the amount of pay for the trip, will, in all cases, be forfeited and retained.

4. Persons making proposals are desired to state their prices by the year. Those who contract will receive their pay quarterly—in the months of May, August, November and February, one month after the expiration of each quarter.

5. No other than a free white person shall be employed to convey the mail.

6. Where the proposer intends to convey the mail in the body of a stage carriage, he is desired to state it in his proposals.

7. The Post-master General reserves to himself the right of declaring any contract at an end whenever one failure happens, which amounts to the loss of a trip.

8. The distances stated are such as have been communicated to this office, and some of them are doubtless incorrect; on this subject the contractor must inform himself, no alteration will be made in the pay on account of any error in this respect.

9. The contracts are to be in operation on the first day of January next; and No 1 to 30 are to end December 31, 1820; the residue are to end on December 31, 1822.
