It is expected that our General Assembly will rise to-day or te-morrow.

On Wednesday, Willie P. Mangum, Esq. was elected a Judge of the Superior Courts, in the place of Judge Toomer, resigned.

In the Senate, yesterday, after a luminous speech on the sabject from Mr. Gaston, the bill for lowering the salary of the Judges of the Supreme Court, was indefinitely postponed.

The Senate has also postponed indefinitely the Resolution passed by the House of Commons, proposing to amend the Constitution of the United States, so as to exclude foreigners from office.

Mr. Dickinson, Senator from New Jersey, has again brought forward the proposition which originated in this State, for amending the Constitution so as to make an uniform mode of electing Electors for electing the President and Members of Congress. We wish it may be successful.

Murder .- On Saturday night last, a negro man, named Daniel, the property of Mr. William Ruffin, of this city, was shot in the yard of Millington Richardson (at whose house his wife was servant) by one of Richardson's workmen, named William Tackett, who it is supposed had an improper connection with his wife. The negro survived but half an hour .-Tackett is committed to jail, to take his trial at the next Superior Court.

Virginia. Thomas Mann Randolph was, on Friday last, elected Governor of the State of Virginia for the ensuing year. Burwell Bassett and Lynn Banks were also in nomination for the office.

James Pleasants, now a Member of the House of Representatives from the state of Virginia, has been elected a Senator of the United States, vice John W. Eppes, resigned.

Maryland .- Sam'l Sprigg, of Prince George County, is elected Governor of the State of Maryland, for the year

Edw'd Lloyd and William Pinkney are elected Senators in Congress from the State of Marvland.

Judge Cooper has been elected Professor of Chemistry in the South Carolina College, vice Dr. Edw'd Smith, deceased.

Steam Ship .- The Steam Ship Savannah, Capt. Rodgers, has arrived at Savannah, in 50 days from St Petersburg, (Russia.) via Copenhagen, Arundel, and Norway, and 33 days from offings, all well, and to use Captain Rodgers' lown phrase, neither a screw, bolt, or rope yarn parted, although she experienced very rough weather.

The following appears in the papers received by the last arrivals from England.

"COWES. "By an act of Parliament, 59th of His Majesty Gea. 3, c. 54, American or Poruguese ships or vessels, entering or toucking at any of the ports of the United Kingdom, are to pay no higher light charges, or other rates and duties, than are payable on British ships.

"JOHN WARD, Collector. Upon every storm, and every deficient coop, the islands of the West-Indies are open and then shut again. This is a singular kind of policy .--But we go to the West-Indies, as the Bakers carts go to the houses. 'Any bread to day? May we call to-morrow?' What name is given to this kind of huckstering? What Baker would be content long in this way without any steady customers? Why cannot the West-India Islands be numbered, and so the trade set off to them by the week, that each may have its turn to be served. We can then be in the neighborhood, watching our Salem Reg. opportunity.

Extract of a letter from Copenhagen, dated Sept. 19.

Business continues miserably dull: no Americans arrive, and it is too late to look for any more this season.-Only forty-four have passed the Sound this year. The Jews have been of late very severely handled in many parts of Germany: about 14 days ago they were attacked in this city by the mob, and most of the windows of their houses broken, repaired, and broken again, &c. The military were called out, and have been ever since doing duty in different parts of the town, to keep order; many of the rioters have been arrested, and some are condemned to the bouse of correction, hard labor, &c. for one, two. & three years. Messrs Meyer & Trier's " house was severely handled .-It has caused considerable confusion,

. Jew Bankers of immense wealth

and some think it is not get all over although there has been no rioting for the last 5 or 6 days.

It is reported that the famous Jew banker, Rothschild, indignant at the ill treatment of his brethren in religion, has refused to discount the paper of any of the bankers in the towns which persecute the Israelites. This refusal has greatly inconvenienced the commerce between England and Germany, and has even caused some stoppages of payments.

Great Runting .- A party of ten young gentlemen of Boscawen N. H. on the I s inst. made a hunting party in the neighboring woods, and returned at twilight, with 1665 grey and red squirrels, heath-cocks, hawks. owls, ducks, partridges, crows, rabhits, muskrats minks, heilge hogs, foxes, and otters 'This (adds the official account) vastly exceeds all former hunting in Boscawen, and we betieve it would place even the sharpshooters of the west in a quandary."
