THEORY AND PRACTICE.

If it were not for the pain that is inseparable in a generous mind from the reflection, it would afford an amusing and curious employment for a few hours—hours, did we say?—months—to compare the practical with the professed systems of modern times. In religion and politics, starting from the divine doctrine of universal salvation and redemption—and accompanying it with the not less divine principle of equality before God—and referring to these, how close would the biting satire of Swift apply. Let us take from the country of Swift, when he drew his experience of practical religion and theoretical government.

Ireland with seven millions people in a state of partial insurrection—and it is remarkable that it is in the most populous and most fertile counties that oppression is most galling: it is not necessary to go to Mexico for practical religion or practical government; they flourish in all the plenitude of modern holiness, under the glorious British constitution as it is practised in Ireland.

Compare the case of the five out of seven millions in Ireland, with those of the like number in Mexico, and what's the difference in beneficence, or christianity, or liberty, or justice. Illustrative of Swift's theory and practice in Ireland a century ago, we see how the glorious balance of power and the downfall of Jacobinism in France and Naples, Genoa and Venice, has worked for the subjects of the glorious constitution in the reign of all the Georges: There are in Ireland

8 Archbishops,
18 Bishops,
300 other Dignitaries,
And 1200 British Clergymen of the Church of England.

The Archbishop of Armagh need not envy the Pope or the Greek patriarch; he has \$70,000 a year. The bishop of Derry has only \$60,000 a year; what a difference between these venerable pastors of the flock, and Peter and Paul, their predecessors. The Archbishop of Cashel, who derives his good things from the second most populous, the most fertile and most afflicted county of the 32 of which that island is composed, has at his dispensation the power and authority to appropriate \$175,000 a year to a few clergymen; of which the payers who bear the service are not as one in 730; this is toleration and religion in theory and practice; but the bishop of Cloyne, who is also billeted on the most populous county of Ireland, has at his distribution the property of the people to the amount of \$250,000 a year—the tithes alone amount to three million four hundred thousand dollars, equal to about one-third of the amount of the whole peace establishment of the United States.

Yet we hear talk of the religious character of a country—its bible societies—its humane societies—its foreign missions—its toleration—its liberty—and it has been in olden times designated as the bulwark of our reli-

gion. With too much reason, Swift said that in Ireland

Religion is a politic law.
