In the Journal of Legislative pro-
ceedings, on the opposite page, will be
found the report of the select joint com-
mittee, appointed to enquire whether
any contract was made at the last ses-
sion of the Assembly, with the Editors
of this paper, on the subject of the pub-
lic printing, and the nature of such
contract. It will be seen on reference
to the report, that the committee state,
no contract was made, the committee
of last session not deeming themselves
vested with sufficient authority to make
any. It also appears, that the trans-
action was viewed in so unimportant a
light, that no order was taken on the
report—that the Senate were not even
apprized of the contemplated negotia-
tion or of its result, that it was an *ex
parte* proceeding, and that from the
time the committee reported, until the
session terminated, not one word was
said on the subject of reducing the sal-
ary. This silence of the Legislature
cannot be attributed to forgetfulness,
for four or five weeks after the report
was made, a bill was introduced into
the House of Commons, by a gentle-
man who served as a member of the
late committee of enquiry, to increase
the services of the Public Printer, by
making it his duty to attach to the acts
of each session, the Comptroller's
Statement of the Revenue and to pub-
lish the same in the State Gazette.—
This bill was passed, though no increase
of salary proportionate to the augmen-
tation of duties, was allowed. About
the same time, a second bill was passed,
prescribing in what manner, the State
Printer shall receive his pay for extra
services, but neither in this or the first
mentioned bill, was the least allusion
made to any understanding on the
subject of a reduction in the pay
of the Printer. Under these cir-
cumstances, we confess that our sur-
prise and mortification was great, when
we found in the report of the Commit-
tee, these words, "how far Messrs.
Gales & Son are morally bound, your
committee say not," leaving room, we
think, for the inference, to such as feel
disposed to draw it, that there was a
degree of moral obligation incumbent
on us, in the business. If the Editors
of this paper had believed themselves
"morally bound" to execute the pub-
lic work, for a less sum than that spe-
cified by law, as their salary, they as-
sure the committee, they would not
have sheltered themselves under the
provisions of a statute, to evade doing
what they found themselves bound in
good faith to perform.

On Saturday last, the Editors of the
Star, were elected by the Legislature,
Printers to the State. We beg leave,
through this medium, to return our
thanks to those gentlemen who yielded
us their support, and assure them, we
feel as grateful for their kind wishes,
as though they had been realized.

JOHN HAYWOOD was yesterday re-
elected by the Legislature, Treasurer
of the State, for the ensuing year, with-
out opposition.

JOSEPH HAWKINS was also re-elected
Comptroller. The state of the vote was
as follows:

On Saturday night last, between 8
and 9 o'clock, when the Stage from Fay-
etteville was within five miles of this
place, the driver was hailed, and a gun
or pistol flashed at him. The driver
immediately whipped up his horses, and
after going about half a mile, stopped,
when the person who had hailed him
came running up, which the driver per-
ceiving again pushed forward, until he
was out of harm's way. There were
two passengers in the Stage, but as
their baggage was inside, no doubt the
villain believed the driver was alone,
and that he being killed, the mail could
easily be robbed.

The Northern Stage left here before
day-light on Sunday morning, with two
passengers, and their trunks on the bag-
gage board, confined by a leather strap:
when one mile from this place, the strap
was cut, and both trunks carried off,
one of which contained, we understand,
a considerable sum of money. There is
every reason to suspect, that the at-
tempt to murder and the robbery, was
the act of one person, as sufficient time
elapsed, between the arrival of the
Southern and the departure of the Nor-
thern Stage, for the plunderer to come
up. The gentlemen who lost their
trunks, returned to this place for the
purpose of investigating the matter, but
no discovery has yet been made.

A line of communication has been
formed between New-York & Plymouth
in this State, and Packets sail twice a
month from each port; and from Ply-
mouth, up the river as far as Weldon,
there is also a regular line of boats.—
The last Halifax paper announces the
arrival of the boat Experiment, Captain
Copeland, from Plymouth, loaded with
Salt, lime, groceries, &c. being the first
of the regular line that has visited Hal-
ifax.

A line of Stages has commenced run-
ning from Salem, in this State, to Knox-
ville, Tennessee, by way of Wilkesbo-
rough, Ashe Court House, Elizabeth-
ton, Jonesborough, Greeneville, New-
port and Dandridge.

On the 20th ult. a man in Gates coun-
ty, by the name of Roundtree, was stab-
ed by another named Lassiter, which
caused his immediate death.

Foreign News.—After an interval of
two or three weeks, we have received
advices from England to the 23d Oct.
Cotton had improved a little—Sea Is-
lands 2d—all other descriptions 3d.

Commodore M. Donough.—The brig
Edwin, Capt. Sears, 29 days from Gri-
baltar, arrived at Philadelphia, brings
the distressing intelligence of the death
of this distinguished officer, who ex-
pired on the 10th of Nov. on his return
to this country. The name of McDo-
nough stands pre-eminent among our
distinguished Naval heroes, and the
splendid victory achieved by his con-
summate skill and courage on Lake
Champlain, must render his fame im-
perishable.

Improved Steam Engine.—A new
Steam Engine has been lately invented
by Mr. John Babcock, of Portsmouth,
R. I. which promises to be the greatest
improvement hitherto made in the use
of steam power. A boat is now run-
ning on this new principle between
Newport and Providence, being pro-
pelled by an Engine which occupies a
space only of six feet by eight, and the
water for generating the steam of which
is injected into the generator at each
stroke of the piston, so that there is no
danger of accidents from explosion.
The boat performs her trip of 30 miles
in four hours and consumes but two feet
of wood and fifty gallons of water each
trip!
