We have not, as yet, been able to make even an abstract of the able report made in the Senate of the United States, on the 19th ult. by Mr. BENTON, on the subject of the election of President and Vice President. The amendment proposed to the Constitution, in this document, is briefly this : that an uniform mode of election, by districts, shall be established; that the institution of electors shall be abolished, and the President and Vice President hereafter elected by a direct vote of the lately met at Milledgeville, Geo. ad people; and that a second election, to journed on the 20th inst. The followbe conducted in the same manner as the ing is the arrangement of the Preachfirst, shall take place between the persons having the two highest number. for the same office, when no one has received a majority of the whole number of votes first given. The committee farther propose, that the first election shall be held on the first Thursday and Friday in August, 1828, and on the same days in every fourth year thereafter; that Congress shall be in session on the second Monday in October, of those years, to count the votes; and that the second election, when found to be necessary, shall take place on the first Thursday in Dec. following. But in case no choice is made by the people, at the second election, the House of Re sentatives is to choose the President as now prescribed by the Constitution-In case the choice of President is made at the first election, and no one has ajority of votes for Vice President, a second election is not to be held for that officer, but the Senate shall choose Vice President from the persons having the two highest numbers in the first
