The old adage that "March comes in like a Lion, but goes out like a Lamb," is so far at least completely transposed, for since the present Month set in, the season has not only been mild, but we have had completely Summer weather.

Owing to the excessive rains of last week, the roads have become intolerably bad, and the mails consequently irregular. There was on Saturday last, no mail north of Petersburg and on Sunday, the northern mail failed entirely.

The following article we copy from the last Alexandria Herald. If true, it presents a singular state of affairs at Washington:

Murder—An atrocious murder (says the Hillsboro' Recorder) was committed in the edge of Person County, at Simeon Cochran's mill, on Wednesday week last, on the body of William Marshall. The body was found on Friday last, buried about two feet deep, two or three hundred yards from the mill, and the place carefully covered over with leaves. A negro fellow belonging to Mr. Cochran, and employed at the mill, confessed that himself and another negro belonging also to Mr. Cochran, had committed the murder, and that they were hired to do so by a white man, and were to have thirty dollars a piece and a new suit of clothes. Fame whispered, that Simeon Cochran and the wife of the deceased, had for some time kept up a criminal intercourse, and this, in connexion with other circumstances, served to fix suspicion on him as the instigator of the foul deed, and he has been accordingly taken up and lodged in Person jail, together with one of the negroes—the other has made his escape.

At a Court of two Magistrates and five Freeholders, convened at Charleston, Michel, a black fellow, owned by Mr. Ganvier, was convicted of the charge of setting fire to his master's house in Meeting St. on the night of the 5th ult. The Court have determined that he shall be hung, and the sentence carried into execution on the second Friday in April next.

In the 20th year of his age, at the residence of his mother in Warren county, on the 16th inst. Gabriel Long Williams. He had been afflicted for the last eight months, with that fatal disease—the consumption. On the 6th ult. in the 79th year of her age, Mrs. Hannah Davis, a most respectable inhabitant of Warren county. At Charlottesville, Va. on the 25th ultimo, Francis W. Gilmer, Esq. Professor of Law in the University of Virginia—a gentleman of profound acquirements, and a public loss. At Winchester, Va. on the 22d ult. Henry St. Geo. Tucker, jr. son of Chancellor Tucker, in the 18th year of his age—a youth whose endowments and promise were highly estimated.

Died, on the 25th ult. near Windsor, the Rev. Richard Poindexter, of the Baptist Church, in the 51st year of his age. Elder Poindexter was Pastor of the Church at Holly Grove, in the vicinity of Windsor; but for 20 years and more, his ministerial labours had been distributed through various sections of the county, besides occasionally a more extensive action. In his early ministry, he was an active and indefatigable itinerant. After he experienced the pardoning grace of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, and in obedience to the divine mandate engaged in the ministry, he travelled through many of the States, preaching the everlasting Gospel, displaying the unspeakable riches of Christ. He was much engaged in the ministry in the latter part of his life, particularly in the late revival in Bertie. On that occasion he displayed much zeal in exhortations among the Churches, and particularly in his anxiety to promote whatever might be a blessing to

them. He was much engaged in the establishing Sunday Schools and in promoting the Tract Society in the county among the Churches.—Those who know him have no doubt of his usefulness in the Kingdom of Christ. Many, doubtless, throughout the various and extensive exertions of his early ministry, as well as those among whom he spent his later life, look up to him as their Father in Israel, and will be the crown of his future rejoicing.—For many years he had been much afflicted; but no doubt he has realized the full extent of the gracious declaration, "though many be the afflictions of the righteous, the Lord will deliver them out of them all."
