The old adage that " March comes in like a Lion, but goes out like a lamb," is so far at least completely transposed, for since the present Month set in, the season has not only been mild, but we have had completely Summer weather. Vegetation is unusually forward, and the Peach and Plum trees are in full blossom.

Owing to the excessive rains of last week, the roads have become intolerably bad, and the mails consequently irregular. There was on Saturday last, no mail north of Petersburg and on Sunday, the northern mail failed entirely. That our roads generally in the southern country are bad, will not be disputed, and the reason why they are so, may be found in the manner in which they are repaired. Indeed mending the roads according to our present system, is almost synonimous with render ing them impassable. In the northern states almost universally, the mode of keeping the public roads in repair is different from that practised in this part of the country, and the consequence is, that they are remarkably fine. Instead of appointing Overseers, and making it throughout a county, (frequently at inconvenient seasons) to send out their bands to work on the public highways. the roads are there kept in repair by annually letting out the work, in convenient parcels, to the lowest bidders. Care, of course, is taken by them, that the road of which they have the superintendence, never becomes bad, which is easily effected by a little work done in due season. The expense is defrayed by a light tax on the citizens at large, and indictments for bad roads. with which our dockets are filled, are never heard of there. This mode is such an one, as we should rejoice to see adopted in North-Carolina. The public good and individual interest equally require attention to this important subject.
