Bank Notes.—In N. York, at latest dates North Carolina Bills, 3 1/2 per cent discount; South Carolina, 1 1/2; Georgia, 2 1/2, except Darien notes, which are 15 to 20; Virginia, 2; Alabama, 4 to 5; Tennessee, 30 to 35; Kentucky, 60; while Louisiana and Mississippi, are at only 2 per cent discount.

The 33 miles between Liverpool and Manchester, are travelled by Stage Coaches in two hours and three-quarters. Half a minute, only is allowed for changing horses, at which 8 persons are employed, 4 to remove the horses, and 4 to place fresh horses to the coach.

The Governor of Alabama has tendered to Captain William Nichols, of this vicinity, the appointment of Architect and superintendent of the public buildings, in that State.

At Newport, Rhode Island, a woman has been convicted of murdering a man, and sentenced to be hanged on the 18th day of May next.

Extract from the Circular of Samuel P. Carson, Representative in Congress, from the 12th Congressional District of North Carolina, to his Constituents:—

Before I conclude, fellow citizens, permit me to bring to your notice the importance of a crisis which is fast approaching—a crisis big with the fate of the people's rights; and one which may decide forever the important question, whether the people will be governed by their own wills, or whether the intrigues, management, and

corruption, of the present ambitious aspirants for office, will again stifle their voices, and triumph over our dearest rights, perhaps, for ever. Such is the importance of the next Presidential election. But I rest confident, that in the contest the people will be heard, and distinctly understood.

Monticello, May 24, 1810. DEAR JOSEPH—I have duly received your two letters, of the 5th and 14th, and am thankful for your aid in the safe delivery of our merrins. The President, on their arrival, had notified me of it, and that he would receive and forward nine to Orange with his own; from thence I can get them here in a day.

LATEST FROM ENGLAND. New York, April 10. The ship Euphrates, just arrived, brings Liverpool papers to the 24th, and London papers to the 23d February.

Mr. Canning was expected to arrive at his house in Downing street on the 24th, and would be able to attend in Parliament on the following Monday.

The report of the death of the Duke of Cumberland was entirely false. Mr. Huskisson was still unwell. The Speaker of the House of Commons was suddenly taken ill on the 23d, while presiding in his place. The House adjourned.
