DEFERRED ARTICLES.

Dwarfs and Giants.—The celebrated Polish dwarf, Bebe, who weighed only a pound at birth, and nine pounds at five years of age, when he was twenty-two inches in height, passed at that period into the service of Stanislaus, King of Poland, and became the monarch's favorite. Ten years afterwards he had attained the height of 29 inches, but he then began to pine, and died (in 1763) at twenty-two, with all the marks of premature old age. Bebe's parents were of the ordinary size. They carried him to his christening in a plate, and cradled him in a wooden shoe. Borwaliski attained the height of 28 inches. He married at twenty-two, and his wife is said to have presented him with several well made and full grown children. His parents were above the ordinary size.

St. Hilaire, a French author, who has recently written on this subject, estimates the height of Goliath at nine feet, cap included; and he observes that modern giants have attained about the same altitude. The greatest average stature of any whole people is said to be 6 feet and an inch, which is the Patagonian case. The Esquimaux and Boschimans (an Ethiopian tribe) are set down at 4 feet, as the minimum of the human race. Both giants and dwarfs are almost invariably imbecile, and die at an early age.

Discovery of Indian Corn.—Previously to the settlement of the Puritans in New-England, they formed parties for exploring the country. Captain Miles Santidiah, who may be called the hero of New-England, commanded one of them, consisting of sixteen men. In their progress they met with several small hillocks, supposed by them to be burial places for the Indians; but as they advanced, finding many more, they closely examined them, and found that they contained Indian Corn. Being buried in the ear, it excited their curiosity, and by some of the

party it was thought a valuable acquisition; while others, who ate it in a raw state, did not relish it, and thought it worth little or nothing. They secured, however, some for seed in the ensuing spring. Squanto, a friendly Indian, instructed them in the culture of it, and it was, probably, the means of saving them afterwards from famine.

William Britton & John Drizzle, Complainants,

Stark Armistead, Trustee of Thomas & William A. Turner, and the said Thomas & Wm. A. Turner, Defendants.

IT appearing to the satisfaction of the Court, that Thomas and William A. Turner, by deed of the thirtieth day of December 1829, conveyed to Stark Armistead, all their Real and Personal and all their Choses in Action, in trust to sell the property and collect the sums due on the choses in action; and that he should with the moneys thence arising pay all the creditors of said Thomas & William A. Turner, if it were sufficient for that purpose: And if it were not sufficient to pay the whole of the debts, that each debt should be paid pro rata. And whereas said debt doth appear to the Court, that William Britton is a creditor of Thomas & William A. Turner and entitled under the deed to have his debts or part of them paid out of the money collected by Armistead: And whereas he hath filed the Bill in this case to have an account of the trust from Stark Armistead the Defendant, and to have his debts paid in whole or in part; And whereas it doth also appear to the Court, that it is not known to William Britton the Plaintiff, who were the creditors of Thomas & William A. Turner at the date of his said deed, and as such entitled to share with the plaintiff William Britton in the trust fund, and to be made parties to this Bill either as Plaintiffs or Defendants. It is therefore ordered by the Court, that this cause, that publication be made in some newspaper in Raleigh, and in the Windsor Gazette, said from the present time till next Term, that the creditors of said Thomas & William A. Turner, shall appear at the next Term of this Court, on the 3d Monday of March, 1834, and cause their debts to be made parties Plaintiff to the Bill on file.
