Druid, (chestnut color), was imported into Virginia in 1809, was bred by Earl Grosvenor, and got by Postos, (son of Eclipse) his dam, (the famous Mare of the Oaks) by King Herod, &c. (See Turf Register, vol. 2, page 414.)

Mark Anthony, was got by Paricut, out of a fine imported Mare, a Partner by Morton's Traveller, out of Selima—no better blood—the immediate descendants of the most favorite Arabians. He was little above fifteen hands high—his form round and handsome. As a Race Horse, he had no rival in his day. (See Turf Register, vol. 5, page 9.) He propagated a Stock which were held in the highest estimation, either for the Tuff, the Saddle, or the Harness. (See Turf Register, vol. 2, page 376.)

Jolly Roger was the first Horse that gave distinction to the Racing Stock of Virginia. He was got by Roundhead, which was by Flying Childers, which was by Darley Arabian. The dam of Roundhead was the famous Plate Mare, Roxanna, by the Bald Galloway, the dam of the celebrated Racers and Stallions, Lath and Cade by the Godolphin Arabian, &c. (See Turf Register, vol. 2, page 574.)

A writer in the Turf Register (vol. 5, p. 112) says: "I knew two Farmers in Guilford, N. C. brothers and living on adjoining farms—each of whom was in the habit of raising one or two colts some years past; and the same Spring, one of them put his Mare to a Horse of good blood, at \$6, (Horses then stood low), and endeavored to induce his brother to patronize the same Horse.
