Prophecy about being Realized.—When it was proposed in the Senate last session, to print 30,000 copies of Mr. Wright's report on Mr. Clay's resolutions, Mr. Tallmadge objected to printing so large a number as a needless expense; and referred to a similar number of the reports of the select committee of the Senate on the Post Office, that were printed some years before, which his colleague, Mr. Wright, said, were used in his part of the State for wadding to cannon fired in celebrating Jackson's victories. Mr. Tallmadge predicted that these reports of his colleague would be appropriate to a similar purpose in "celebrating, "the excellency," with which I am grammatically. How much more true dignity was there in the simplicity of address among the Romans.—Marcus Tullius Cicero, Decimo Bruto Imperatori, or Caius Marcello Consul, than "to the honorable John Doodle." My objections are perhaps trivial and whimsical: but, for my soul, I cannot help stating them. If, therefore, I should address a letter to you, without the "excellency" tacked, you must not esteem it a mark of personal or official disrespect, but the reverse." Lynchburg Virginian.

The trial for murder in Baltimore.—In the case of William Stewart, on trial for the murder of his father, the evidence and pleadings were brought to a close on Saturday, the 27th ult. and the jury, on Sunday evening, brought in a verdict of murder in the second degree. The testimony was altogether circumstantial and exceedingly voluminous, occupying seven or eight columns of the Baltimore papers. The motive of the murderer appears to have been impatience to come into possession of a small estate which his father had bequeathed to him by a will, executed only a few weeks before the murder, which was found in his possession when he was arrested. The trial has naturally excited great interest in Baltimore. Credit is the poor man's lever, by which he can and does compete with the rich capitalist, upon a footing with him. The Sub-Treasury scheme will have a direct tendency to destroy the opportunities of the poor and create a monopoly of the rich who need no credit.

The true points at issue in this controversy, are not Bank or no Bank, but Sub-Treasury or no Sub-Treasury,—whether the finances of the nation shall be subject to the control of the people and their Representatives, or placed at the disposal of the President and his officers.
