2d Resolved, That as Mr. VAN BUREN has consented to run for re-election, practising the very evil pointed out by Gen. JACKSON and himself, we have evidence enough before us, that the reform alluded to, cannot be expected from that quarter; and as Gen. HARRISON has given a pledge to reform the evil by declining a re-election, thereby superseding the necessity of touching the Constitution for that purpose, without considering the many other advantages to be derived from his elevation to the Presidential Chair, we call upon all the good citizens of our common country, earnestly to reflect on the subject, and to join us in the election of an individual, in whom the good of the country, the peace, prosperity and happiness of its citizens are so deeply involved.

3d. Resolved, That looking to qualification and honesty, as the only test of fitness for office, we viewed with feelings of pleasure the sentiments of Gen. Harrison's name from the resolution; which was accordingly done, and Gen. Harrison himself demanded an investigation into his conduct. The subject was referred, not to a special committee, but to the Military Committee, one of the standing committees of the House, not appointed with the slightest reference to this subject. Col. R. United States, was Chairman of the Committee, who, after a patient investigation, reported as the unanimous decision of the Com-

mittee, that no shadow of suspicion rested on Gen. Harrison. This report was adopted, and a resolution was then introduced, voting the thanks of Congress and a gold medal to
