BORDER TROUBLES.

From indications along the Canada border, there is ground for the belief that fresh disturbances of a serious nature must soon take place in Canada, which may materially affect many citizens of the United States. and give rise to other and further negotiations between this and the mother country, if not an open rupture.

Annea Brush dragoons recently came into Vermont, six miles across the line, and forcibly carried off into Canada a Col. Grogan, formerly a resident in Canada. The affair has stirred up the martial spirit of the Yankees, who threaten vengeance against this " national insult." The papers on both sides of the line indulge in a uscless deal of bravado.

JOSEPH R. INGERSOLL (formerly a distinguished Member of Congress) has been nominated by the WHIGS as their candidate for Congress, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. SERGEART, and has accepted the nomination.

JACOB GRATZ, Esq. was nominated to fill the vacancy in the State Senate of Pennsylvania, in the place of Wm. B. Reed, Esq. of Philadelphia, resigned.

From latest accounts it appears that the Yellow fever in New Orleans was on the increase. The moitality is acknowledged, we see by the New Orleans papers, to be dreadful. The Yellow fever is also raging violently in Charleston, in various towns of Flori-

Who that hath a spark of feeling, will fail to heave sigh for poor human nature, when he reads (as you are about to do) the following paragraphs, detailing the particulars of a recent murder in New York City? Robbery, murder and all manner of villainy are so common now-a-days in the crowded communities of the North, that to give an account of all, would be surrendering our entire space to such matters. In New York City, however, there exists a refinement in crime of which this is an instance-killing a man and deliberately packing him up in a box and shipping him to St. Louis! We unsophisticated inhabitants of the country dream not of what scenes are daily and hourly enacted in our large Cities, and many times, we may almost suspect, winked at by the Police authorities.

We condense the account as given in the N. Y. Sun: It seems that a highly respectable master Printer, named Samuel Adams, mysteriously disappeared from his acquaintances on Friday the 17th of September. It now appears that on the night of the 17th uit. (the day he was missed) he had called upon a Mr. J. C. Colt, teacher of book-keeping, and author of a work on that subject, printed by this Mr. Adams, and for which Colt was indebted to the amount of 200 dollars. examined-suspicious indications of foul work discovered, and Colt was arrested. The box in the vessel was meanwhile also examined and found to contain the body of Mr. Adams, packed up in salt !

Colt has been fully committed for trial, other strong evidences of his guilt having appeared at the Coroner's inquest, and on the trial before a magistrate. By the advice of his Counsel, he denied the charge imputed to him, and refused to answer questions.

RAIL ROADS

The New York and Erie Rail Road, now rapidly progressing, and part of which has just been opened to travel, seems to be constructed more substantially and to be better calculated for the conveyance of heavy freights, than other Roads beretofore constructed, as the subjoined paragraphs from a New York paper will show. The width of the track is especially a very great improvement :

"The track is six feet wide-the ordinary width being about four feet eight inches. It is made also in the most substantial manner. The iron rails are of enormous size, weighing about fifty-six pounds to the yard, and are laid upon a continuous bearing of sound sills, eight by twelve inches square. It is calculated for the transportation of every kind of heavy freight, such as 105- Jack Frost paid us his first visit, yesterday lumber, coal, iron, wheat, flour, live stock, merchandise, and indeed every thing that goes to market-all to be carried in trains laden with three hundred tons and upward. It is also calculated to transport passen-

gers and the mails at the highest rates of speed. "The passenger cars which pass here are of the nost elegant description. They are about three feet wider, I think, than cars are usually built, and they are high enough to permit the tallest man to stand upright and walk about. They appear to be in every way commodious. I perceive also that the company has had the good taste to add to them many valuable little conveniences, such as retiring rooms for the ladies, sofas for the weary and indisposed, &c. &c., which are too often neglected on our railroads. It is contemplated to make the cars which are to go through the whole length of the line still more commodious than these, which are made to run between the river and Goshen only by daylight

"The locomotives are what are called eight-wheel cars-four driving wheels of prodigious power, weighing, I think, about fifteen tons each."

The end of the world put off till further notice. -A prophet in Brazil, of the Miller class, who had on the 2d of August last, finding the event did not "come off," has announced in a "card," published in a Pernambuco paper, that the grand denouement s postponed till further notice. The "preparations" were not completed, and "hence," says the Prophet, the postponement of the deluge."

Steamboat Accidents on the Western Waters .-The Cincinnati Republican gives a list of the accidents to steamboats on the Western waters, which have come under its notice, from January 1st to September 1st, by which it appears that twenty-two were snagged, nine sunk or injured by collision, four burned, two \$1,350,000. The above, it is said, do not include ed only for the unexpired part of the present Session, more than two-thirds of the accidents which have happened in the months as stated above.

The last sentence of this was probably added by some prejudiced eastern editor, who had never been in the west; but, if true, what is this number of accidents (mostly of a trivial nature) to the swarm of boats in use? There are more than eight hundred steamers employed on the western waters, and most of the rivers are difficult and dangerous to navigate for a greater part of the year. The wonder is, rather, that so few accidents occur.

A Wisconsin paper remarks that the extensive scale the West, is without a parallel in the Eastern States. One farmer in the vicinity of Michigan city, raised twenty thousand bushels of wheat this year!

It is thought by some that the editor of that "Wisconsin paper" must own and wish to sell some townlots in or near Michigan City.
