SECOND DECLARATION OF AMERICAN INDE-PENDENCE.

Platform Adopted by the Confederated Industrial Organizations at St. Louis, Mo., Feb.

22-24, 1892.

This, the first great labor conference of the United States and of the world, representing all divisions of urban and rural organized industry, its action the blessings and protection of Almighty God,, puts fortl to and for the producers of the nation this declaration of union and independence. The conditions which surround as best justify our co operation. We meet in the midst of a nation brought to the verge of moral, political, and material ruin. Corruption dominates the ballot-box, the legislature, the Congress, and touches even the ermine of the bench. The people are demoralized. Many of the States have been compelled to isolate the voters at the polling places in order to prevent universal intimidation or bribery. The news-papers are subsidized or muzzled, public opinion silenced business prostrated, our homes covered with mortgages, labor impoverished, and the land concentrating in the hands of capitalists. The urban workmen are denied the right of erganization for seif-protection; imported pau-perized labor beats down their wages; a hireing standing army, unrecognized by our laws, is established to shoot them down; and they are

rapidly degenerating to European condition The fruits of the toil of millions are boldly stolen to built up colossal fortunes, unprece dented in the history of the world, while their possessors despise the republic and endanger liberty. From the same prolific womb of governmental injustice breed the two great classes—paupers and millionaires. The national power to create money is appropriated to enrich bond-holders; silver, which has been accepted as coin since the dawn of history, has been demonstized to add to the purci asing power of gold by de-creasing the value of all forms of property, as well as human lawor, and the supply of currency is purposely abridged to fatten usurers, bankrupt enterprise, and enslave industry. A vast conspiracy against mankind has been organized on two continents and is taking possession of the world. If not met and overthrown at once, it forbodes terrible social convulsions the destruction of civilization, or the establishment of

an absolute despotism. In this crisis of human affairs the intelligent working people and producers of the United States ave come together in the name of peace, order, and society to defend liberty, prosperity and justice.

We declare our union and independence. We assert our purpose to support the political or-ganization will represents our principles. We charge that the contro ing influence dom-inating the old political parties have allowed the existing dreadful conditions to develop without perious effort to restrain or prevent them. Ti ey have agreed together to ignore, in the coming campaign, every issue but one. They propose to drown the outcries of a plundered people with the uproar of a sham battle over the tariff; so that corporations, national banks, rings, trusts, "watered stock," the demonetization of silver, and the oppression of usurers, may all be lost sight of. They propose to sacrifice our homes and children upon the altar of mammon; to destroy the hopes of the multitude in order to secure corruption funds from the great lores of

We assert that a political organization, repre-menting the political principles herein stated, is mecessary to redress the grievances of which we

Assembled on the anniversary of the birth of the illustrious man who led the first revolution on this continent against oppression, filled with the sentimen which actuated that grand generation, we seek to restore the government of the hands of the "plain people," with whom it eriginated. Our doors are open to all points of the compass. We ask all honest men to join with and help us. In order to restrain the extortions of aggregate

eapital to drive the money changers out of the temple to form a perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty for ourselves

and secure the blessings of therty for ourselves and our posterity wed ordain and establish the fellowing platform of principles:

First—We declare the union of the labor forces of the United States this day accomplished permanent and perpetual. May its spirit enter into all hearts of the republic and the uplifting of

PLATFORM.

First—We demand a national currency safe, sound and flexible, issued by the General Government only, a full legal tender for all debts, public and private; and that without the use of banking corporations a just, and equitable and efficient n cans of distribution direct to the people at a tax not to exceed 2 per cent, be provided, as set forth in the Sub-Treasury plan of the stone time, \$1.00.

All land now held by railroads and other corporations in excess of their actual needs, and all lands now owned by aliene, should be reclaimed by the government and held for actual settlers only.

TRANSPORTATION. Third—Transportation being a means of ex-change and a public necessity, the government should own and operate the railroads in the in-

terest of the people.

a. The telegraph and telephone, like the postoffice system, being a necessity for transmission
of news, should be owned and operated by the government in the interest of the people.
