

VIRGINIA TOBACCO MARKETS

THE receipts on the Richmond market are a confined largely to sun-cured goods and the sales amounted to about 750,000 pounds. Fillers were a shade higher, but on the whole there was little change in class of offerings, or in prices.

Lawrenceville .- There were heavy sales on this market, with the majority of the offer-ings of the bright kind. All the grades offered sold well, and the farmers seemed well pleased with figures received. There were some good offerings on dark shipping goods.

Danville.--In the neighborhood of 2.500.-000 pounds were handled. There was some improvement shown in prices, as well as in quality, but there was a lot of low-grade tobaccos from districts not heretofore selling here. Small lots of redried tobacco are now selling.

South Boston .- The sales here ran up to around 1,000,000 pounds, with an average price of 8 cents. Much of this was of inferior quality prices no better. The farm-ers are rapidly disposing of their crop, and up to date this market has sold over 15,000;-000 pounds.

Chase City .- The sales have been heavy on this market, already about 4,500,000 pounds have been sold to date. During the week 250,000 pounds have been sold. Prices are much lower than for the past season, this due to great extent to poor quality of offerings.

Lynchburg.—The sales on this market footed 897,400 pounds. The receipts con-tinue very heavy, but lighter ones are looked for soon. Prices have weakened perceptibly on good leaf, which made a lower average than for the week previous.

Petersburg .- This market continues very active on both light and dark stocks. The sale for bright during the week was 151,806 pounds, sale of dark tobacco for week was 284,350 pounds. Sale of bright to date 2,079,784 pounds. Sale of dark tobacco to date, 1,982,427 pounds. J. M. BELL.


