Southern Farmer's Business

PETTING the Mountains to Market G-Up in the Asheville, N. C., region, there are no money crops such as cotton, tobacco, and peanuts. Just food and feed crops with a small surplus of each to sell. No markets are at hand therefore, the mountain farmer could not prosper without some way to market his surplus.

Into the Asheville region came a young man for his health, who got a vision and consecrated himself to a mission. Today J.G.K. McClure of Fair-view, N. C., is recognized as a mountain-farmer leader.

The Farm Federation, which Mr. Mc. Clure has organized to get mountain products to market, owns three ware-houses and does \$25,000 to \$35,000 of business each week. The federation is a stock company, the farmers owning the stock. The stock is paying 6 per cent and the farm income of those belonging to the organization has been doubled. The mountains have reached the market and Mr. McClure found the

The other day, Mr. McClure and his associates concluded that with more capital they could do a bigger and more profitable business So they concluded to sell some bonds. The business men of Asheville snapped up the bonds. The farm federation was adding wealth to the region, thereby increasing the prosperity of Asheville, so of course Asheville is ready to boost the undertaking.

One of the Biggest .- Forecasts indicate a corn yield that will equal one of the biggest on record. Over 3,000,000,000 bushels are expected. The largest corn crop of record was in 1920 when it was 3,209,000,000 bushels.

Seed Supplies.—The bur clover seed crop harvested in the South is smaller than last year. South Carolina has about as much seed as last year. Alabama is about 50 per cent short.

Seed oats are plentiful. Based on shipments from heavy producing areas the commercial supply of seed in 1922 is 25 per cent larger than in 1921.

The total commercial supply of Southern rye seed is estimated by the United States Bureau of Markets at 25 to 35 per cent larger than last year.

More white clover is produced in Wisconsin than any other state.

Lespedeza or Japan clover is grown for seed in lower Mississippi delta in both Louisiana and Mississippi and some seed are harvested in northern Alabama, Southern Tennessee and Southern Arkansas. It is harvested in late October or in November and goes on the market immediately thereafter.

Mule Business Picks Up.—According to reports of the United States Department of Agriculture the mule demand of 12 principal receiving markets of the Cotton Belt picked up during the first six months of 1922. During that period 43,042 mules were received as compared to 27,234 the previous year.

The Southern farmer paid an average of \$83 a head in 1921 but in 1922, he succeeded in buying his mules at an average of \$71.50. The high water mark in prices paid by the cotton farmers for mules was in 1920 when the average cost was \$123.80 per head.

Tennessee Pools Wool. - Sixteen counties of Tennessee pooled their wool, sold 134,291 pounds, averaged, it is claimed, 71/2 cents a pound above the local markets, and thus increased the wool growers' income \$10,071.82. C. A. WHITTLE.

Implement Exhibits at the Fairs

PROBABLY the greatest weakness in Southern agriculture from the standpoint of economical production, next to low yields per acre, is the lack of efficient labor-saving machinery in use on our farms. Each man cultivates too few acres, because too small implements are used and too much hand labor is employed.

Because our farmers have not learned to economize labor by the use of larger and more efficient machines and implements, the machinery exhibits at the fairs have not received the attention they deserve.

There is no other opportunity for studying farm machinery and implements equal to the large state and district fairs. trict fairs.
