Three slight earthquake shocks were felt at Saratoga Sunday evening.

The Legislative Executive and Judi cial Appropriation bill was passed in the House without division.

The Supreme Court has decided that State laws providing for the seizure of liquors brought into a State in original packages are unconstitutional.

Asheville's working men have held a meeting and unanimously declared in favor of a resolution that they will not work more than 9 hours a day.

About 1000 packing house employees in Chicago have decided to go on strike unless they are granted eight-hour as a days work.

The Comptroller of Currency has authorized the Peoples' National Bank of Winston, N. C., to begin business, with a capital of \$100,000.

It is stated that the capital for the new Bank of Fomento to be established in the city of Mexico, has been practically secured. This institution has \$25,000,000 nominal capital, one fifth paid in.


