WHAT IS TRANSPILING AT HOME AND ABROAD.

Matters of Interest From All Points as Reported in Our Exchanges, Giving a General Synopsis of Current Events.

General John C. Fremont died in New York July 13.

An entire South Carolina town had no census taken.

There is said to be growing signs of war in Europe.

At Kansas City and Omaha Sunday the thermometer went up to 104.

A pitched battle occurs between two factions at Ysleta, Texas. One man killed.

Senators Sherman, Teller and other Republican Senators denounce the Force bill.

The Silver bill has passed the Senate and goes to the President for his signature.

Two trains collided near Bloomington, Illinois, on the 13th and ten people were killed.

Dallas, Texas, had a million dollar fire on Tuesday. Brunswick, Ga., followed with a \$200,000 fire.

Spain has put a prohibitory duty on the importation of American flour into her West India possessions.

A white man has been arrested at Danville, Va., for making a criminal assault upon his own daughter.

A brakeman on the Norfolk and Carolina railroad dies from injuries received while coupling freight cars.

A cottage on Clason avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., has been leased to a negro, and the neighbors threaten to move away.

A woman at Fair Haven, Vt., murdered her two children, a girl 17 and a boy 6, set fire to the house and cut her throat.

It is the purpose of the Republicans in Congress to pass a reapportionment bill under the new census at the present session.

A collision on the Chesapeake & Ohio road causes the death of one of the firemen and a tramp stealing a ride on the trucks.

Detective J. W. Napier, who was out with warrants for members of the Hatfield party in West Virginia, has been assassinated.

Little Canada, a village of 500 inhabitants near St. Paul, Minnesota, was badly wrecked by a cyclone, and one entire family were blown into Lake Gervais.

The gag law rule of the Senate Republican Caucus Committee is very ingeniously constructed, but will effectually cut off debate so that the Election bill may be passed.

New York Democrats acknowledge the necessity for a solid Democratic front in the coming elections, and a movement for a union between Tammany and the County Democracy is on foot.

Mark J. Sullivan, for neglecting to perform the duties of census enumerator at Portland, Maine, after he was appointed, has been found guilty and held for \$1,000 in the United States Court.

The campaign in South Carolina is getting hotter as the days roll by. A convention at Columbia declared that Tilman shall not be Governor. Anti Tilman clubs are to be formed all over the State.

Hanlan, Teemer, Hosmer and Wise will accept the challenge of the Eries of Buffalo, New York, to roar them a 4 oared race for \$5,000, and the championship of the world as soon as the details can be arranged.

At Social Circle, Ga., James Harrison, colored, attempted to outrage Mrs. Sarah Williams. He was captured and carried to a mill pond and has not been heard of since. He is no doubt at the bottom of the pond.

After all Gov. Nichol's veto of the Lottery bill holds goods because a member of the Senate named Fisher Smith died before the lottery men could get him to the chamber to cast his vote for the bill. Death prevented the veto from being overriden.

A riot occurred a few days ago at Star's mill pond near Griffin, Ga., in which four negroes were killed and six wounded. Was caused by a dispute between a white man and a negro. There were over 500 people on the ground and it a wonder that more people were not killed.

Richard Reed, 16 year old son of John Reed, who lives 4 miles from Charlotte, met with his death by a singular accident Saturday. He was ploughing a field and on reaching a small ditch the horse jumped it, throwing the plow handles against the boy's stomach. The boy was knocked senseless, in which he continued until death that night.

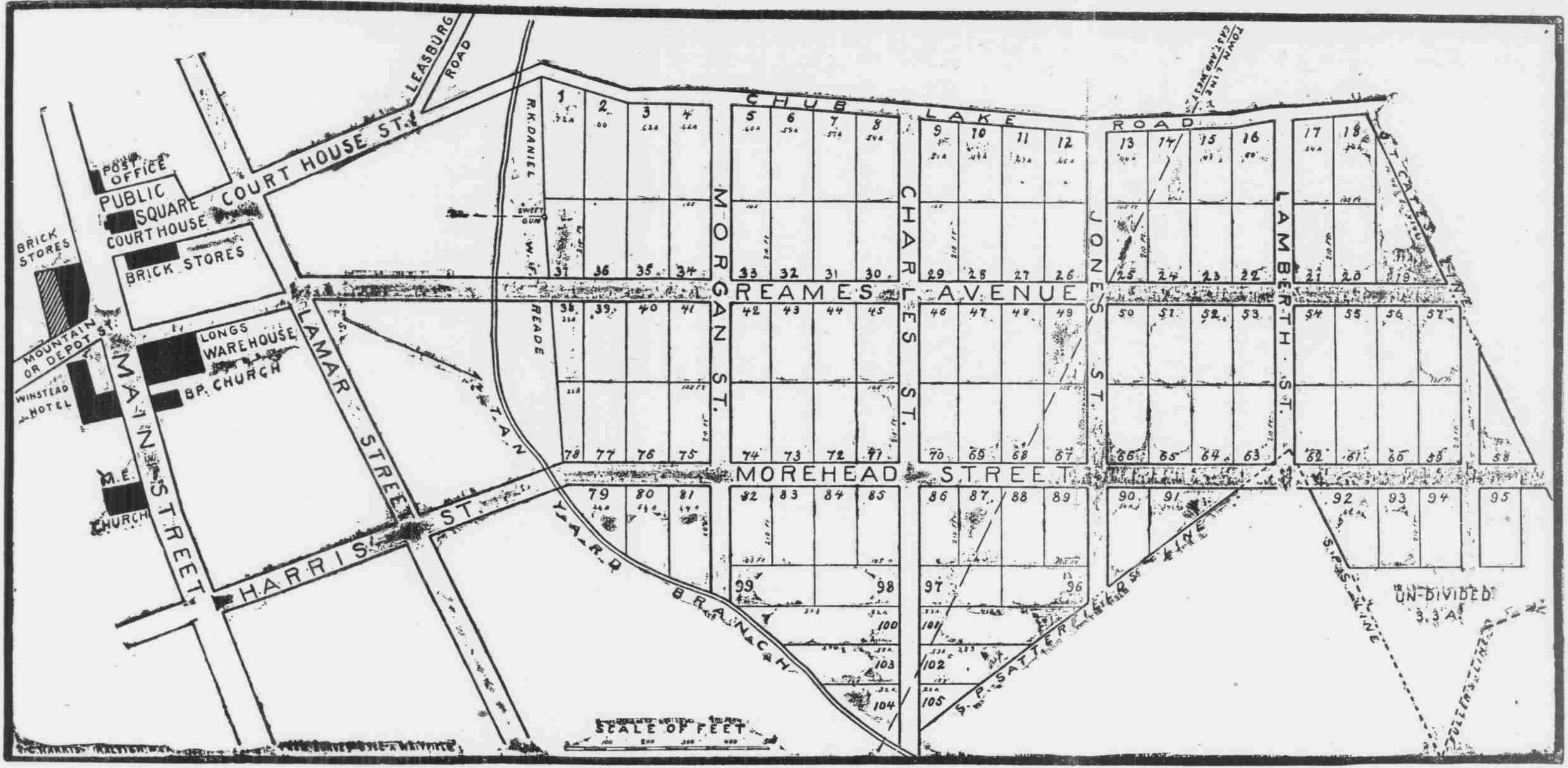
A terrible cyclone struck Lake City, Minnesota, the 13th just before dark. Every one in doors were killed numbering 200. An excursion boat was on the lake Peikin was capsized with over 200 on board. A large number of children and nearly every body on board were drowned. A large amount of property was destroyed. At last accounts about 80 bodies had been recovered from the lake. It was only last week a cyclone passed over a portion of Iowa and 700 people were killed.
