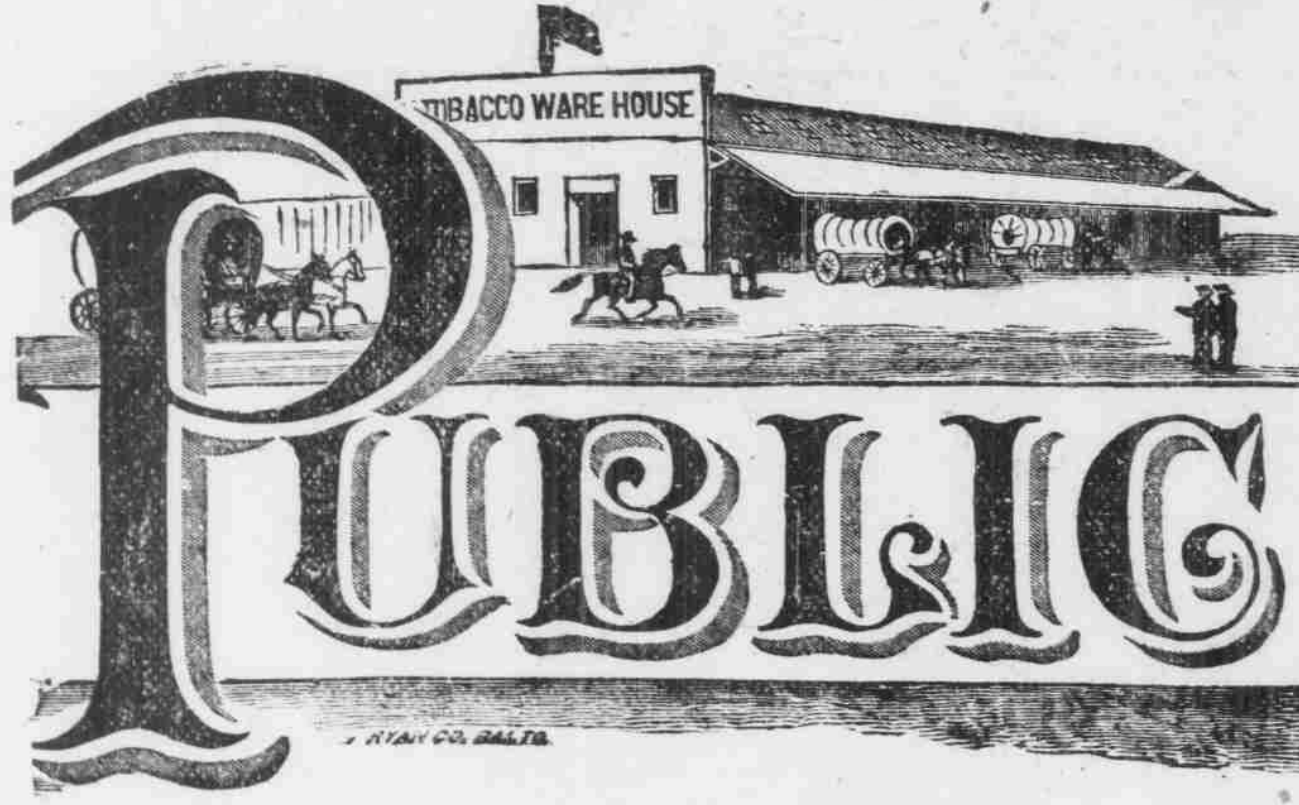

Of the new analyses finished during the coming season, the results will be mailed every two weeks, as they are completed. If you desire these special bulletins, applications must be made to the Station at Raleigh for them. They will only be sent to special applicants.
