JUDGEJOHN A. GILMER DEAD. Judge John A. Gilmer died at his

home in Greensboro after a lingering illness on March 17th.

Judge Gilmer was born in April, 1838. His father was Hon, John A. Gilmer, one of the ablest congressmen previous to the war and who achieved a national reputation. Judge Gilmer graduated with distinction at Chapel Hill in 1858 and read law at the University of Virginia. The war came on before he had obtained his license and he entered the Confederate service in April, 1861, as second lieutenant of Company B, of the Twenty-seventh North Carolina Infantry. On the organization of that regiment he was elected Major of the regiment, and as such commanded it at the battle of New Berne. In 1863 he was promoted to the colonelcy of the regiment, and commanded it until he was so severely wounded at Bristow station as to incapacitate him for further active duty. He served with conspicuous gallantry and enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his officers and men.

These cases were fought stubbornly and vexatious delays interposed before final awards were made.
