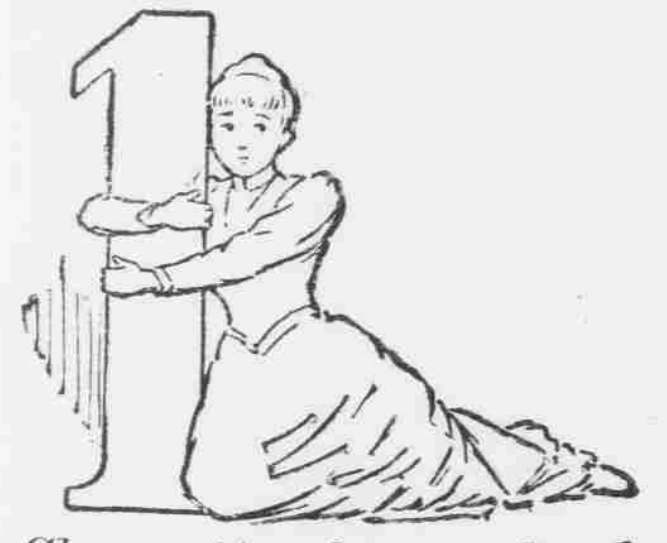

—A. T. Wilson, of Morganton, son of Major J. W. Wilson, of the State Railroad Commission, was in Oxford Monday.

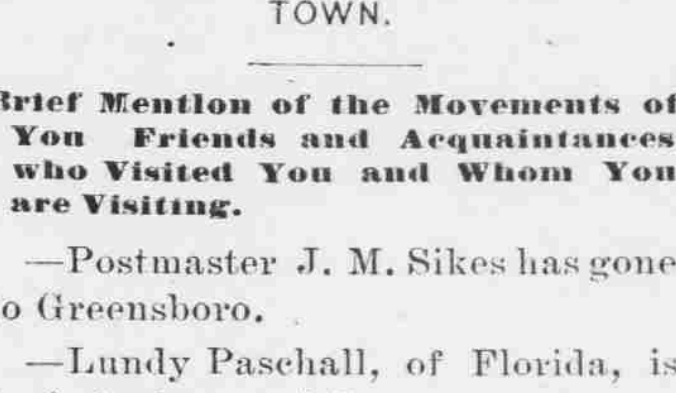
—Col. W. A. Bobbitt and E. T. Crews left Tuesday to attend the Grand Encampment, I. O. O. F., at Winston.

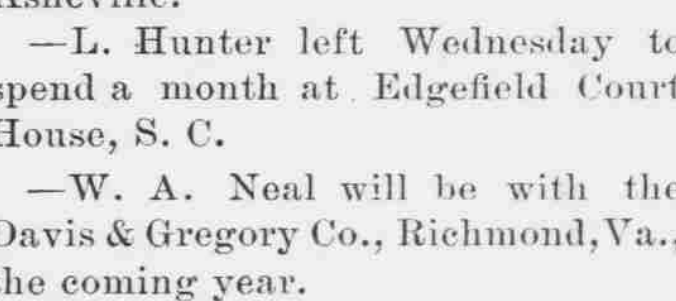
