Over two thousand people greeted him at this point with banners, flowers and bands of music. At Newbern they took the doors off the hinges, turned out the guard and painted the town red. There was a great display of fire works, bands of music, cannon, etc.

Person County Jubilee.

Roxboro was ablaze with enthusiasm and democracy Nov. 12. Although mourning in sackcloth and ashes because of the defeat of the democratic candidates in the county and for the senate, she rejoices with the fifth district, the state and the nation in the tidal wave of democracy. A grand democratic jubilee and torchlight procession, with fireworks, bonfires and speeches, was the bill of fare. At 9 o'clock over twelve hundred people began the celebration with a torchlight procession, passing through every street in town. A large number of transparencies bearing appropriate devices were in the line. Mounted marshal in charge of Chief Marshal J. A. Long had charge. A number of colored democrats were in the procession which was headed by a drum corps and the United States flag.

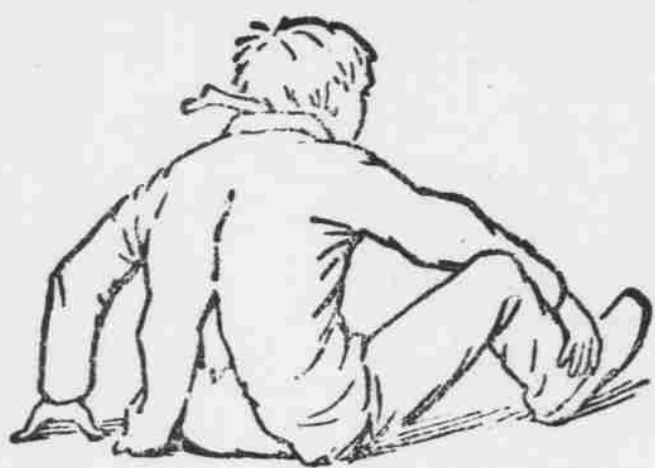

A special to the News and Observer from Camden, dated Nov. 11 says: As the result of yesterday's fire there is but one grocery store left in town. All the drug stores, jewelry store and furniture stores, the post office and telegraph offices were wiped out. Twenty families are rendered homeless. The loss is estimated at from \$350,000 to 500,000.
