DR. F. W. HANCOCK.

Just after this meeting he was appointed by His Excellency Gov. A. M. Scales a member of the Board of Pharmacy of the State.

In 1890 the Association met at Morehead City for the first time, and Mr. Hancock was the local secretary. At this meeting he was elected secretary, succeeding E. V. Zoeller, of Tarboro, and was re-elected three times. Mr. Hancock is a member of the American Pharmaceutical Association, and now has re-entered the business, will doubtless be again heard from in the meeting of druggists' organizations. It has been demonstrated that Oxford will support but two drug stores, and as the field is now occupied it shows a willingness to fight against big odds for any one to open a third store there, but as Mr. Hancock has large family connections in the vicinity, and being a good druggist and most affable man, he will doubtless bring success from failure.
