NOTES OF THE DAY.

THE LOCAL HAPPENINGS SERVED IN SHORT PARAGRAPHS.

Minor Events, Retrospective and Prospective, Gathered About the City By Our Alert Reporters.

The Masonic Lodge here is adding many new members.

Some work is being done towards improving the "bottom" on College street.

The locating committee did not express any more opinions than "the law allows."

There will be a marriage in the city tomorrow, the contracting parties being popular young society people.

Prof. A. Bellezza closes his dancing school with a soiree tonight. He goes from here to teach a class in Henderson.

The new officers of the Oxford Lodge I. O. O. F., No. 103, elected at last meeting, will be installed tonight.

There is a heavy break of tobacco here today, and it is not likely all the warehouses will be reached before night.

At the glass-ball shooting yesterday afternoon Policeman N. H. Whitfield proved the crack marksman, breaking thirty-five balls out of thirty-eight.

The county board of education this afternoon completed the apportionment of the public schools funds. The amount apportioned was \$11,000, sufficient to run the schools for four full months.

The married men must invent some new excuse to come uptown after supper. "Going after the mail" won't do now the schedule has been changed and the train from the north gets here in the afternoon.

The public school census of Granville county this year shows between three and four hundred more white children of school age than negro children. Heretofore the latter have been in the majority.

Today the committee of the Farmers' Alliance received in writing the proposition for sites for their proposed warehouse in Oxford. Tomorrow the county convention meets again, and the matter will be settled.

The Baptist Female College Committee Visit Oxford and See the Sites.

Four out of the five gentleman on the locating committee of the Baptist Female College arrived in Oxford this morning on the train from Raleigh. They are: Mr. N. B. Broughton and Rev. J. W. Gwaltney, of Raleigh; Dr. C. A. Rominger, of Reidsville, and Rev. J. L. White, of Durham. Col. L. L. Polk, who is the other member of the committee, was unable to come, being confined to his bed with sickness.

The local reception committee met the visitors at the depot with carriages, and showed them the sites offered for the College as well as the sights of our beautiful little city.

The County Commissioners.

The county commissioners of Granville were in session again today, adjourning early this afternoon.

In addition to the proceeding published in THE DAY yesterday, the following business of general interest was transacted:

A. M. Veazey, J. A. Waller and L. A. Wilkins were appointed a committee to ascertain the cost of building a bridge across Knapp of Reeds' creek on Fish Dam road, near J. A. Waller's plantation, and report to next meeting of the board.

The time for holding meetings of the board of supervisors was changed to first Saturday in August and first Saturday in February.

Licenses to retail liquor were granted to C. R. L. Mathews, R. Broughton and M. F. Loonam, & Co., all of Oxford.

Z. W. Allen was allowed \$400 per year for services as superintendent of the county poorhouse.

Sheriff Rogers submitted his report of collections for December:

Road tax,	\$491.14
State tax,	2,296.92
School tax,	1,717.46
County tax,	4,622.03

Total, 9,027 55

A number of claims were allowed, corrections made of taxes erroneously listed and several persons admitted to the poorhouse.

INGS.

General and Interest Clipped from Exchanges.

The Durham Sun says it is rumored that the Tobacco Plant will be revived.

Evangelist Fife, the ex-drummer, is holding a religious revival at Durham.

Raleigh held a mass meeting last night, and raised \$5,000 towards securing the Baptist Female College.

The Teachers' Assembly have completed arrangements to have present at the next session in June Rev. Dr. Talmage and the great humorist Eli Perkins.

The Supreme Court of the United States yesterday assigned what are known as the North Carolina bound cases, involving the validity of about ten million dollars worth of bonds, for argument on the twentieth inst. These cases have been pending more than a year, the court declining to assign them for hearing during the last term for reason, it is understood, that Justice Matthews was ill and the court was nearly evenly divided on the questions at issue.

Rev. C. L. Powell, a Baptist preacher, who, as an independent missionary, went to Algiers, North Africa, from North Carolina, has in a fit of insanity murdered his youngest daughter, aged 6 years, by cutting her throat with a pocket-knife. He made an attack on his wife, who fled and thereby saved her life. He had been in an asylum in Algiers, but having improved was allowed to go home, and soon after made this murderous attack. He is now in an asylum in Algiers. His wife and four children are very anxious to get back to North Carolina.

Gov. Fowle yesterday fixed the day of execution of four men, appointing the same date, February 7th, for the execution of all of them, says the News and Observer. These are John Wilson, convicted of murder in Yancey county at the spring court of 1889; Manly Pankey, convicted of murder in Montgomery county, fall term, 1889; Samuel Halford and R. P. Willis, both convicted of burglary in Rutherford county, at Spring term, 1889. All the parties took appeals to the Supreme Court, but the judgment in each case was confirmed. The next month will have its full share of hangings in this State. In addition to the above there are Parrish and Boyle, of this city, and Lije Moore at Greensboro, who are also under death sentence.

IN A GENERAL WAY.

Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

La Grippe is proving fatal in a number of instances in New York and in European cities.

It is said of Governor McKinney that he never took a drink, smoked a cigar or uttered a profane word.

Stanley sees fine prospects for railways in Africa. According to his estimates 800 miles could be laid down for \$17,000,000. This mileage would open to commerce four great river basins, with a total area of 2,370,000 square miles, and a total population of 80,960,000. Of the resources of the region he speaks in the highest terms.

A dispatch from Wildcat, Ark., says that the wedding of John Mayfield and Mrs. Sarah Rich was interrupted by the appearance of an officer who had a warrant for the arrest of the bridegroom on the charge of shooting a man named Cook during a quarrel some hours before. The bridegroom begged the officer to allow the marriage to take place, which he did, and afterwards took Mayfield to the nearest jail.
