A REMARKABLE spot in Vermont is the farming town of Waltham, which contains 9,760 acres of land and has 248 inhabitants. It has no post-office, church, town house, poor house, store, lawyer, doctor, blacksmith's shop, nor even a bridge, and yet it is one of the thriving towns of Addison County. Its taxes are merely nominal.

NEWS has been received at St. Louis from the Government expedition for the survey of Alaska. The letter is dated August 21, and says there are luxuriant forests, the grass was green, flowers in bloom and the weather very warm, but ten inches below the surface the ground is frozen hard, even as deep as twentyfive feet.

GREAT BRITAIN mined almost 10,000,-300 more tons of coal, iron and other minerals last year than in 1887, and employed 10,000 more men in the work, but fewer lives were lost in the process. The total number of fatal accidents was 385, and of deaths occasioned thereby 160, being an increase of four in the acsidents, but a decrease of ninety-one in :he lives lost.

THE villages and cities upon the rivers below Johnstown, Pa., are beginning to perceive the effects of the great disaster at that place in the lowering of their sanitary condition. Plainly the streams are contaminated; there are over thirty cases of typhoid fever in the hospital of Allegheny, and from two hundred to four hundred cases of the same disease ander treatment in private families.

"PENNY FAMINE" is now what threatons the large cities of the West and Southwest. The people have learned to use the long-despised one cent coin, and the needs of circulation have increased ar beyond the power of the Governnent machinery to supply them. The Philadelphia mint is two months behind with its orders for those pieces, in spite of keeping at work night and day turning them out.

For the first time on record a lady has seen appointed a deputy collector of inernal revenue. Miss Phœbe Couzins has been a deputy United States marshal and has wielded a revolver and caried handcuffs, but she never had to risit regularly the tough dives and more lecent saloons of a wicked city and inspect Government licenses. This is what Miss Mand Cotton, just appointed a deputy collector for the Seventh Inliana district by Collector Throop, will save to do.
