OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE FARMERS' ALLIANCE

As Furnished by Publication Committee--Bright Tobacco Farmers Form Special Permanent Organization.

OXFORD, N. C., Jan. 11.—The convention of the Farmers' Alliance and Industrial Union of the bright tobacco ton, Mecklenburg county, Va. belt of North Carolina and Virginia met in the Opera House here at 11 ham, N. Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that it is for the good of the order and the advancement of our cause that all Alliancemen patronize the Alliance co-operative warehouses and factories as established or may be established in the different tobacco markets.

The convention adjourned at 1, p. m., subject to call of the president. The delegates returned to their homes fully satisfied that the work of the convention will result in much good to the Alliance and all industrial classes. They appreciated the cordial hospitality of the citizens of Oxford, who vied with each other in generous attention to them, and left with the kindliest feelings towards the town and its citizens individually, who donated over \$4,000 to the Alliance of Granville county to assist in building an Alliance Warehouse here. This aid was accepted in the spirit in which it was tendered, and work will begin at once. An Alliance Warehouse was established in Oxford over a year ago, and has proved a complete success. The order has also located in this city a tobacco factory, manufacturing both plug and smoking goods, and which has been awarded a diploma by the North Carolina State Agricultural So-
