## THE LOCAL HAPPENINGS SERVED IN SHORT PARAGRAPHS.

### Minor Events, Retrospective and Prospective, Gathered About the City By Our Alert Reporters.

A fair-sized break of tobacco was on the market today.  
The Masonic Lodge have a meeting at their rooms tonight.  
The Chamber of Commerce meets again next Friday night.  
The regular meeting of the Oxford Lodge, I. O. O. F., No. 103, tonight.  
A negro was arrested yesterday for slander and furnished with a cell in jail.  
There is a large number of horses and mules, for sale or exchange, in the city.  
The usual lively vendors of patent medicine have not put in an appearance this court.  
We learn that Mr. M. L. Coley, of this county, will cultivate a half million of tobacco hills this year.  
Presto! presto! change! and the thermometer drops again to the bottom of the well, and cold weather is with us once more.  
The deed for the lot on Main street, purchased for the new warehouse, was turned over to the Granville County Farmer's Alliance today.  
Through the fault of the mail agents somewhere along the route the New York newspapers have been getting to Oxford very irregularly of late.  
The Durham *Sun* learns there is some probability of the Postal Telegraph Company's line to be extended from Oxford to that city very soon.  
Mrs. J. Johnson and Mr. H. L. Davis were summoned to Louisburg by a telegram yesterday announcing the death of the infant daughter of Mr. Henry Creshaw.

The grip seems to be on the increase in our community. Fortunately it appears here in a mild form, and the persons attacked are not sick more than a day or two.

Only those who have not had La Grippe are inclined to treat it with levity. The persons who have been inhabited in the mysteries of this grip have all possible respect for it.

The horse swappers are holding their usual Tuesday-in-court bazaar in the lot in the rear of Armory Hall. The aggregation of old rips comes up to the standard. The blind, the maimed and the halt are all there.

The Raleigh *Call* of yesterday says: Mr. Hewlette Blackley, of Oxford, was taken suddenly sick last night at the residence of Mrs. A. E. Jackson, on Blount street, where he was visiting, and was unable to return to the hotel.

Chief of Police Renn showed us today an old sword found upon the bed of Squire Grissom, who was murdered in Brassfield township in 1888. It is supposed to be the instrument which caused his death, although an axe covered with blood was discovered near by. Grissom's son to-day carried the sword home.

In mentioning yesterday that there was no criminal case of any special interest to be tried at this term of court, we overlooked that of Jordan Pritchard, who will be again arraigned for murder. He was on trial last fall, but the jury failed to agree. A special venire of a hundred and fifty will be summoned to appear next Thursday.

The admission to the concert to be given by the ladies of Oxford for the benefit of Baptist Female University fund will be one dollar, and at least a five hundred dollar house is expected. ### PRINCIPAL CASES DISPOSED OF SINCE YESTERDAY NOON.

The Trial of Jordan Pritchard, for Murder, to Begin Thursday--Special Venire Ordered.  
The following are the principal cases disposed of by Granville Superior Court since yesterday noon:  
State vs. James Weaver, larceny; case declared off.  
State vs. Luther Roberts, affray; failing to appear judgment nisi entered and capias ordered.  
State vs. Mose Roberts, larceny and receiving; nolle pros with leave.  
State vs. Alvin Lyon, retailing; convicted at last term and judgment suspended until this term; sentenced to two months in the county jail, with leave for county commissioners to hire him out or work him on public roads.  
State vs. John Reams, forcible trespass; case dismissed at cost of the prosecution.  
State vs. Noah Landis, disposing of mortgaged property; nolle pros with leave.  
State vs. Jordan Pritchard, murder; a special venire of one hundred and fifty men was ordered and the trial fixed for Thursday.  
State vs. Zakariah Landis, cruelty to a mule; verdict of jury guilty.

## STATE SIFTINGS.

### North Carolina Items of Interest Clipped and Condensed from Exchanges.

The grip having siezed upon the Wilmington letter carriers, the delivery service is temporarily suspended.  
It is authoritatively announced that the rumors of a change in the management of the Richmond & Danville railroad are without foundation.  
The R. & G. Railroad shops at Raleigh have just turned out a locomotive which is pronounced a first class piece of machinery in every respect.  
The S. S. Convention for the Sixth District, embracing the counties of Granville, Durham, Person, Caswell, Alamance, Orange and Chatham, will be held in Durham February 14th and 15th.  
The trial of Mrs. Cora Scales Morris, at Wentworth, charged with murder of her husband, was ended yesterday, resulting in the acquittal of the accused. The jury was out only five minutes.  
The Governor has refused to interfere in behalf Lige Moore, sentenced to be hanged at Greensboro, and Manley Pankey, condemned to the gallows in Montgomery county, on February 7th.  
A Washington dispatch of yesterday says: Justice Bradley today delivered the opinion of the United States Supreme Court affirming judgment of the United States Circuit Court for Eastern District of North Carolina in the case of Wm. E. Christian et al appellants vs the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad company et al. This case is of importance, not only in the amount of money directly involved, but in the important constitutional questions decided. Of late a number of cases involving the questions of the liability of the State to be sued have been brought before the Supreme Court. The court is of the opinion that the State is an indispensable party to any proceeding in equity in which its property is sought to be taken and subjected to the payment of its obligation. This virtually decides the pending Temple case.

## IN A GENERAL WAY.

### Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

Senator Bill Chandler took another turn at grinding the outrage mill yesterday.  
Just now "the glorious climate of California" has deposited sixteen feet of snow near San Francisco.  
A fire at the navy yard at Portsmouth, N. H., yesterday morning destroyed some buildings and entailed a loss of over one hundred thousand dollars.  
It is stated that in accordance with the recommendations of the Senators from Washington, the President has appointed P. H. Winston, of Spokane Falls, and Captain Brown, of Tacoma, District Attorney and Marshal, respectively. Their nominations have not yet been made to the Senate, but the papers have been signed. Mr. Winston is a brother of our townsman, Mr. R. W. Winston.

Passenger train No. 1 on the Monon Railroad, which left Chicago Sunday night at 11:55 o'clock, was wrecked yesterday at 7:50 o'clock, a. m., one mile above Carmel, Indiana. The train was running at a rapid rate and was approaching a long trestle across Wilkerson Creek when the tender of the engine jumped the track. The engineer reversed his engine but before the air brakes could check the speed of the train the locomotive and baggage car had cleared the trestle, but the sleeper and smoking car went over in the creek, both taking fire almost immediately and being consumed in a remarkably short time. Five cars were almost totally consumed. The total casualties are six dead and nineteen injured, most of whom are seriously hurt, and some likely to die.
