**THE DAY FIXED FOR THE EXECU-
TION OF PRITCHARD.**

**Judge Armfield Passes Sentence To-
day--Three Persons Sent to the Peni-
tentiary.**

Judge Armfield passed sentence
today on Jordan Pritchard, found
guilty of the murder of Daniel Mose-
ley. He was sentenced to be hanged
on Friday, the 7th day of March
next, between the hours of 9, a. m.,
and 4, p. m. An appeal to the Su-
preme Court was taken.

Three persons were convicted since
yesterday noon of offences which
land them in the penitentiary

State vs. Dicy Norwood; larceny of
ten dollars; four years in the peniten-
tiary.

State vs. Robert Hammill; larceny
of an opossum; four years in the peni-
tentiary.

State vs. Randall Lyon; receiving
stolen goods; five years in the peni-
tentiary.

IN A GENERAL WAY.

**Important Happenings in Other States
and Countries.**

Jake Kilrain, Sullivan's late victim,
did up the big Frenchman, Felix
Vacuelin, in New Orleans, in a fight
Saturday.

The morning papers give particulars
of the terrible calamity which befell
Secretary Tracy and his family yester-
day. THE DAY's account was sub-
stantially correct, with the exception
that the fire originated in the Tracy
mansion, and besides Mrs. and Miss
Tracy, a servant girl lost her life. The
details are horrible.

The Republicans, for the first time
since the meeting of Congress, had
yesterday a quorum voting. Mr.
Smith, the Republican contestant from
West Virginia, was declared entitled
to the seat in the House by a strict
party vote, 166 yeas, nays 0. He ap-
peared and took the oath of office. The
Senate adjourned immediately after
reading the journal in respect to Sec-
retary Tracy.

The New York *World* of Sunday
announced the winner in the guessing
match for the time of Nelly Bly's trip
around the world. He is F. W. Stev-
en of New York. The actual time of the
arrival was seventy two days, six
hours, eleven minutes and fourteen
seconds. Mr. Steven's guess was
seventy-two days, six hours, eleven
minutes and fourteen and two fifth
seconds. He thus came within two-
fifths of a second of the time. His
prize is a trip to Europe, all expenses
paid and two hundred and fifty dollars
pocket money.

CONCERNING WOMEN.

A Bengal girl who has just entered
her 10th year, will appear as a candidate
at the next matriculation examination
of the Calcutta university. She is the
daughter of a gentleman serving in a
distinguished capacity in a native State.

Mrs. Marion L. Morgan of Shu Tieh,
Shansi, North China, is endeavoring to
start in that country a home for infant
girls. Her appeal has already roused
the interest of many child-lovers, but
more funds are needed before the home
can be started.

Some years ago a daughter of Harriet
Beacher Stowe gave Mrs. Francis Hodg-
son Burnett a thin gold ring set with a
single moonstone (moonstones are ac-
counted as "lucky" stones), and shortly
afterward she made her first success in
the field of literature, where she had
